FROM THE SURGERIES

2023 PATIENT SURVEY REPORT

The Patient Participation Group (PPG), on behalf of the Blackmore Vale Partnership holds a Patient Survey every two years.

The first part asks the same questions each time about the appointments system and satisfaction with the process and outcome for patients.

We also asked what concerns people had about their health and The second half seeks to find out what matters to patients, to offer assistance with accessing online information & support and asking about wellbeing - and what mattered to them. Here, the majority talked about having annual health checks, and there were a great many who mention those who are carers. the menopause. Also continuity of care was a popular theme.

The survey was made available on the Practice website, links were sent by text to around 16,000 patients and about 150 paper surveys were completed during the Covid & Flu clinics – in all there were 2575 responses.

For those who would just like to be reassured that all is well, it is completely understandable and a good idea. We asked for comments about the process of contacting the Practice, the response and outcome for the individual. The majority were positive and appreciative - many mentioning the speed of response after making a Klinik (online) application. There was lots of praise for staff, particularly reception, or Patient Services staff.

Overall 73% were satisfied in the process of contacting the Practice and the outcome. (70% 2021) 17% were partly satisfied and of those, many were awaiting the next part of their treatment or consultation, but in quite a few cases, their issue was resolved, but not by a GP - so there's still the sense amongst guite a few that only GP's can advise and treat which isn't the case

Of the 10% who were not satisfied, it was clear that issues with Klinik, insufficient staff, it is not always feasible for every patient to see their or perceived issues with Klinik, were the main reason. It's important to clinician of choice. remember, Klinik is only one way of contacting the Practice. If you have the internet or a smartphone, then you might find it better. As before any urgent out of hours issue should be addressed by contacting 111 either online or by 'phone, or if life threatening, then call 999.

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Other comments were about not hearing back about blood test results. The Practice submits about 500 blood tests every week (there could be more than 5 samples as part of the blood test).

If there are issues with a test result, the patient will be contacted with advice about what to do next. Unfortunately, there simply isn't the staff capacity to contact every patient whose test is normal or normal for them.

Having access to your patient record, either through the website or on the NHS app, allows you to check these results. You can see the records of your appointments, including those at hospital and order your prescription medications.


If you don't have this facility, contact the Practice and they can set it up SystmOnline for you. The NHS app can be downloaded and set up by vourself.

With regard to health checks, if you have a long term condition, this will be part of your care.

There are local organisations like LiveWell Dorset who carry out free health checks and if you are aged 40 to 74, have not had an NHS Health Check in the last 5 years and do not have a pre-existing condition such as heart disease, diabetes or kidney disease or had a stroke, you may be eligible to have a health check.

Taking the Environment Around Marnhull Seriously

Fancy getting out into the open air? Well, a Green Team has been developing an exciting new project for you: a survey of the natural environment of the whole of Marnhull parish. Want to join in...?

To protect our environment, we should first know what we have. So this survey aims to identify and catalogue areas within the parish which are of importance for biodiversity.

These include hedgerows, woods, verges, 'wild' meadows and field margins, ponds, streams and marshes, and items such as bat- or birdboxes, wild flower patches and insect hotels. Anything that supports, or could be adapted to support, our natural environment should be recorded

We have divided the parish up into small survey areas - usually a quarter of an Ordnance Survey 1km grid square - and are busy preparing colourcoded sketch maps as survey tools.

We think an initial survey of each area can be achieved in a morning's or an afternoon's walk. The map accompanying this article shows the parish (in yellow) and the areas for which sketch maps are ready for you to use. We will produce the rest as quickly as we can!

The idea is that people taking part will visit each area and amend the sketch maps as appropriate, adding more detail where they can and noting places which will benefit from closer study later. At time of writing, these surveys can only be conducted from public rights of way. Permissions will be sought to access farmland where necessary on foot or by drone; but these are not yet in place.

Any help you can offer will be welcome. You can do a survey, or let us know if you have detailed knowledge of or a particular love for certain places. Either way please do get in touch, by emailing marnhullgreen@ outlook.com or phoning (01258) 268714. If you would like to try a survey let us know which of the areas on the map you would like to tackle, and we will give you the sketch maps and some guidance notes. It might reassure you to know that you don't have to be a highly knowledgable naturalist! Anything you can do will help. We look forward to hearing from you.

Among other things our survey will help inform the Neighbourhood Plan. Major development proposals for Marnhull are now being considered by the planning authorities. Whether you are for or against give us a try. particular schemes, it is important - many of us would say critical - that any development should be as 'green' as possible, to protect and enhance Lyn's bingo returns from Its winter break on March 4th. our natural environment and help secure it for future generations.


Dorset Council have prepared three useful documents to guide the consideration of climate change in planning applications and to support decision-making until the new Dorset Council Local Plan is adopted. These documents will be of interest to anyone concerned about development in the parish. They are:

• interim guidance and a position statement addressing sustainable design and construction and planning for renewable energy schemes

• guidance on listed buildings and energy efficiency; and

• a sustainability checklist setting out questions for applicants: submitting the completed checklist as part of an application has been a requirement since 15 January.

Current planning policies allow for the building of new 'affordable' housing costing anything up to 80% of market value. This means that in many rural areas the 'affordable homes' being provided are often anything but.

Local authorities have not replaced social housing at the rate properties have been sold under the Right to Buy policy, leading to a chronic shortage of housing for people who need it most.

In Cornwall, where more than 15,000 families are on social housing waiting lists, the number of properties for short-term let at much higher prices than social rents, grew by 661% in the five years to 2021.

Half of the families on social housing waiting lists in South Lakeland could be accommodated in local properties available exclusively as holiday rentals, while Devon has seen 4,000 homes taken off the private rental market and 11,000 new short-term listings since 2016.

The government has legal powers to protect council housing purchased under the Right to Buy scheme from being sold off at market rates or as second homes. CPRE's research is the first published study to look at the overall coverage of these so-called 'Section 157' powers. CPRE found that these powers only apply to half of all rural parishes in England.

They exclude whole counties such as Bedfordshire and Cambridgeshire, and also large towns. There are several large towns, particularly places like Cirencester, Frome, Padstow, Sherborne and St lves in Southwest England, where there is a particular lack of affordable housing.

The report contains a list of recommendations that CPRE believes will help to solve the severe housing crisis in the countryside. It includes calls for the next government to:

Ensure the term 'affordable housing' is redefined to directly link to average local incomes. Increase the minimum amount of genuinely affordable housing required by national planning policy and implement ambitious targets for the construction of social rented homes


Support local communities to deliver small-scale developments of genuinely affordable housing and make it easier for councils to purchase land at a reasonable price, enabling the construction of social housing and vital infrastructure.

Introduce a register of second homes and short-term lets, with new powers for local authorities to levy additional council tax on second homes.Extend restrictions on the resale of 'affordable housing' to all parishes with fewer than 3,000 inhabitants to ensure properties continue to be used by local workers, not as second homes or holiday lets

CPRE Chief Executive Roger Mortlock said: "Decades of inaction have led to an affordable housing crisis. Solutions exist and the next government must set and deliver ambitious targets for new, genuinely affordable and social rented rural housing.

Record house prices and huge waiting lists for social housing are driving people out of rural communities, contributing to soaring levels of often hidden rural homelessness. Urgent change is required to ensure we don't end up with rural communities that are pricing out the very people needed to keep them vibrant.'





Our Year 6 children are joining with those from other local schools to go to London, visit the sights and see The Lion King on stage. This is looking to be a brilliant day and an amazing experience for the children.

Collective Worship

Our value this term is Faith which the children will be exploring through a range of themes including gratitude, commitment and patience during our daily worship and reflection times. The worship ambassadors will be helping Rev Gaenor and Rev Angus to deliver the message during the weekly church services at St Gregory's Hi I'm back, it's me Lily but this time with one of my best friends, church and during the school worship times.

Hedgehogs Class

Hedgehogs Class has enjoyed a busy start to their learning for this half term with our theme of 'Winter'.

We discussed what are the signs of winter and how these compare to the season of Autumn. We were lucky enough to have some frosty and icy days for us to explore the school grounds looking for these and using them to create word banks. We will be using them to create a senses poem during our English lessons. In Maths the Reception children have been thinking about the composition of the number 5 and how it can be made using smaller numbers.

Year 1 have been exploring teen numbers to 20 and thinking about tens and ones using apparatus such as beads strings and Numicon to create numbers to 20. Knowing how many tens and ones are within a number and creating pictorial representations for them. In Curious-city learning our new enquiry is called 'How are schools the same?' We will be geographers comparing schools around the world and their similarities despite the location.

We will explore the connection with the world ending with our challenge to create posters showcasing similarities with another global school using a choice of paints and pastels. In other areas of the curriculum, Hedgehogs class enjoyed their first Forest school session of the year.

Although very chilly, fun was had by all! We will also be learning a new exercise called 'Pound' using drumming techniques and exercise during P.E. sessions this term.

In R.E. we have been thinking about how Jesus showed friendship to others reading stories from the New Testament about how lesus showed kindness even during difficult times. We will use these to explore our own friendships and the theme of forgiveness.

Badgers

Happy New Year to all.

Before the Christmas break, Badgers Class was learning how to write a non-chronological report and identify shapes from their properties. We looked at the features of shape poems and used the ideas learnt to write our own shape poems related to Christmas.

In Maths, Year 2's learnt about how shapes (2D and 3D shapes) have different properties such as number of vertices, edges, faces etc. Year 3's learnt more multiplication and division facts: 3's, 4's and 8's using arrays and pictures. In Curious-city, Year 3 and 4 have been learning and exploring the Enquiry question "Why do we live here?" As geographers, the children showed great research skills used an atlas to identify what the different lines mean and other facts about different countries.

As historians, we also looked at Ancient Egyptians and identified why Egyptians lived near River Nile and how the population changed overtime. They have also been artists and created wonderful perspective artwork.

We also took part in the school nativity, used a range of media for Christmas arts enjoyed other related fun activities related to Christmas. The children had great fun going on a Santa Walk around the village and singing Christmas carols on the way.

MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIR OF THE PARISH COUNCIL

A Happy New Year to you all.

It has been 10 months since I became Chair of Marnhull Parish council (MPC). It feels like an awful lot has happened in that time and I thought it would be worthwhile to reflect on 2023 and to look ahead to 2024.

2023: - well it certainly wasn't boring! From my perspective it was dominated by two things. Firstly, the imminent and then actual arrival of the Tess Square and Butts Close application.

I was pleased to see so many people attend the Parish Council meeting in early December. Our response has been submitted and can be found on the MPC web site. We wait for the Dorset Planning Committee to meet.

Secondly, the early stages of the creation of the Neighbourhood Development Plan and Village Questionnaire. I was also extremely pleased to receive over 500 responses and we are working our way through the detail and will publish the highlights and then all the results early in 2024. Thank you to everyone who submitted a response.

I am proud of the way the Parish has responded to these challenges and it represents a massive amount of work by the respective teams. I would personally like to thank Steve Winder for taking us all through the intricacies of the planning process in a clear and simple way and the quality of the response submitted to Dorset Council.

I made mention of the energy and enthusiasm of the Neighbourhood Plan team in my last note; they have been tested by all the work to develop, issue, and collate the Questionnaire. My thanks to Jules Cormack, Stephen Boyce and Steve Penson and the team for all their hard work.

2024: - I have to say I don't think the workload for the council will reduce at all in 2024. We have further planning applications to review, planning appeals to prepare for and attend (Tess Square, Musberry Lane, land North of Crown Road) and the heavy lifting for the Neighbourhood Plan. Just think, this time next year we could be close to getting the Plan approved! All that plus council elections in May; more about that later.

Finally, I would like to also review the key challenges I set out last time:

•Planning - we will continue to keep the parish informed on all the major planning applications in 2024, this isn't going away!

•Neighbourhood Plan – I've said all I need to say on this subject!

•S106 commitments - we still await the first 'spade in the ground' on any of the approved major developments (Burton Street development is the closest to starting) and we are in dialogue with Dorset Council to ensure they understand how our thinking and priorities are changing over time. I suspect this will become more prevalent in 2024.

•Keep doing the day-to-day work - a big thank you to all the councillors for making sure the important basics continue to be delivered. It is very easy to be distracted by the 'big' stuff and neglect everything else. I am grateful that this is not the case.

•Engagement – I would like to think we have improved this over the last 10 months or so, but you will be the judge.

I have asked councillors to write articles for the Messenger so you will get to hear from them rather me in 2024! Meanwhile, I will continue to make visits to local societies, schools, and events as I can so that I can see firsthand what happens and give you an opportunity to say hello.

Happy New Year - if it's not too late to say that! We hope you all enjoyed the festive break and are gearing up for all that spring and the rest of the year may bring. MVC have been working in the background on putting procedures in place to help us run smoothly, efficiently and be ready to react to any situation that may arise. To that end, we have been working particularly closely with the Parish Council to put into place an Emergency Response Plan.

Sounds as though we're expecting the sky to fall on our heads at any moment – we're not! However it is always good to be prepared to a certain extent and the ERP is just that. No doubt you remember the power cuts following (one of) the storms last year and how that affected some.

No power to charge phones, heat food, heat the home etc. As you'd expect, the villagers rose to the challenge and before too long the Village Hall was open for people to use and various offers of help had come in for all sorts of scenarios.

The Plan currently being drawn up will put a structure in place for just this sort of situation so there will always be a central point of contact to disseminate information, organise the appropriate response and ensure nothing or no-one is left high and dry – although in the event of flooding that is probably exactly what we want!

Once the Plan, still in it's draft stage, has been approved and ratified by the Parish Council it will be published for all to see so everyone will have be able to have an understanding of the first actions to take in the event of need.

MVC is not just about responding to emergencies or providing transport. We also offer support in other ways and so we are pleased to support and recommend a new initiative dealing with feelings of loss.

This is a wide-ranging emotion, experienced by us all at some point in our lives, whether it's through loss of our partner, a family member, a pet, possibly redundancy or even the gradual loss of someone dear to us through dementia or poor health.

It can often feel as though we are the only one going through this and some people find it difficult to admit to the variety of emotions they may feel - anger, despair, denial, loneliness and so on.

A new group is being formed specifically to help with this - here are some words from one of the group leaders:

A colleague and I are proposing to start a grief support group in Marnhull in conjunction with Marnhull Village Care.

Currently the venue needs to be confirmed but we hope to start the group in March. It can help to talk through feelings of loss with others who have been through it too, and as facilitators we both have first hand experience of bereavement.

We are qualified in working with individuals and families at end of life, the bereaved and those who have suffered loss. If you would like more information please contact:-Flora - 07778431264 Nicola - 07975570381

JOIN DORSET'S 4000 FRIENDS AGAINST SCAMS

Today, just over 1 in every 100 people living in Dorset are a Friend Against Scams.

Friends learn how to spot the signs of a scam, so can stop themselves from falling for one. Also, because Friends know the signs of a scam, they can also use that learning to help to spot other people who are potentially affected by this type of fraud.

By having simple everyday conversations Friends can help to keep others safe, whether family, friends, work colleagues; anyone a Friend might meet.

Friends often encourage other people to become a Friend too, helping to grow the scheme in Dorset. Friends also know where to report a scam and where to go to get help.

It's very easy to become a Friend. Anyone can. Just visit www. friendsagainstscams.org.uk and take the 20-minute online training at a time to suit you. If you don't have a computer, then ask at your local library how to access the training from a public access computer.

If you are part of a group and would like face to face training for a larger number of people, then please contact Trading Standards on the email below.

Some people ask us about opportunities to volunteer with Trading Standards as a Dorset Council Trading Standards Community Volunteer.

Volunteers become SCAMchampions who encourage others to become Friends in a more structured way. YOUR MONTHLY **TECH** UPDATE **CHRIS RYU** Dorset Tech

Hello and welcome to this new monthly column where I give you a brief overview of what's changing in the world of technology and how it will affect you in Marnhull. We have a broad range of readers and so I'd love to hear your feedback on the level of detail I give and the types of technology I cover, so that I can adapt in future issues. Let's dive right in...

ULTRA FAST BROADBAND

As you may have heard, Marnhull was selected as part of the Fibre roll-out and Wessex Internet have been working recently on connecting the village in 3 phases of roll-out. I'm told that we were the first to be connected and while we did have some issues I'm pleased to say that we now have working fibre to the premises. They claim to offer speeds of 900Mbps down and 450Mbps up, which for this part of the village is a huge leap ahead of the 14Mbps that BT were able to give. It should be noted that they're still ironing out some kinks with the speed, but it's at least been reliable

If you'd like to get Wessex Internet Full Fibre in your property visit • Asus unveiled a 2 screen laptop at a "reasonable" considering the wessexinternet.com

Another option that works well in the village is Starlink. This involves having a small dish fitted to your house, or placed in your garden and the internet is beamed down to it. On average we were getting 160Mbps down and 80Mbps up, so again much better than BT were able to offer. We now have a dish for sale if anyone is interested and wants to save some money!

LANDLINE DIGITAL SWITCH OVER

As Chris Walton mentioned in December, BT are retiring analogue phone lines by December of next year. The network is old and is becoming expensive to maintain alongside fibre alternatives.

These changed have already started and your provider will contact you to tell you what will happen. If any equipment changes are That's all for this month - see you next time! needed, your supplier will need to provide them for free.

IMPORTANT: If you are dependent on your landline – for example you have no mobile signal at your home - your provider must offer you a free solution to make sure you can make emergency calls when the power is out. This can just be a battery pack (called a UPS) that will power your landline phone during emergencies.

Please let your provider know if you have a care alarm, health pendant or security alarm that uses the phone line. There are solutions for this and the provider will get them set up for you, but you must make them aware before the service is switched over to ensure there is no down-time.

AI TECH ROUND UP

I can't talk tech in 2024 and not talk about AI, it is everywhere! Almost every app or website enquiry I'm getting at the agency involve some kind of Al functionality.

This months AI feature is a proof of concept developed by Meta called AI Actor. This can take a line of text and create a photo realistic 3D model of a person, then taking an audio clip, it will animate that virtual actor in a very realistic way.

Another one to watch is "Magnific" which allows you to zoom in to an image to an almost microscopic level. Any description I give you won't do this one justice, Google Magnific Burger to see what it can do.

Finally, the Samsung S24 Ultra releasing this month has a feature that can take a video of upto 8K resolution and using AI, create additional frames to make the video a slow motion one. That's not slowing down the video, it's actually creating new parts to the video - insane!

Welcome to Dorset Lore, a monthly column featuring the rich heritage of folklore, tradition, ghost stories and legends of the county of Dorset.

We begin close to home with a Shrovetide tradition that was followed here in Marnhull.

Until about 120 years ago on Shrove Tuesday it was a custom in Sherborne for children to take any cracked or useless crockery known as 'shards' around the village with them as weapons and, upon arriving at a neighbour's front door, sing:-

'Here I come, I never came before, If you don't give me a pancake I'll break down your door.'

They would then throw the crockery at the door smashing it. The house owner was then supposed to come outside and toss a pancake for the children to catch.

Similar happenings occurred in Marnhull, Blandford and other places. As a result, Shrove Tuesday was known by some as Lin-Crock Day.

This comes from the wonderful 'Dorset up along and down along' first published in 1935 - A collection of History, Tradition, Folk Lore, Flower Names and Herbal Lore gathered together by members of The Women's Institute and edited by Marianne R. Dacombe.

I have already gathered lots of folklore specific to Marnhull and surrounding villages and would be very interested to hear what stories locals recall, what their sources are, and what variations there are of the stories I have already researched.

DORSET MUSEUM AND ART GALLERY

Dorset Museum & Art Gallery raising funds to keep rare Treasure hoards in the county

Dorset Museum & Art Gallery is currently raising funds to keep two rare archaeological hoards in the county, both of which were found by metal detectors and declared Treasure. Acquiring them will complement the Museum's existing archaeological collections which have national and international significance.

The first is a group of 40 gold stater Iron Age coins, found at Charlton Marshall near Blandford Forum in north Dorset. Dating to the 2nd century BCE, the hoard is incredibly unusual, as the coins were imported from France. They were made by a Gaulish tribe called the Baiocasses and very few similar finds are known from Dorset and the south coast.

The second hoard is a Middle Bronze Age hoard found in Stalbridge. It consists of a palstave axe head, a bangle with incised decoration and a rapier sword. The rapier is very unusual. Not only was it apparently deliberately broken in three pieces and buried, but the hilt was shaped to mimic a wooden handle. Only two remotely similar (and incomplete) examples could be identified in Britain. It does however have some similarities with the solid-cast hilts of Nordic rapiers from Scandinavia. This hoard has huge potential for display, but also future research which will enable the Museum & Art Gallery to continue to flesh out the story of our Dorset forebears.

It all started at the GP surgery. The Patient Participation Group was

discussing why so many folk with no obvious physical illness were

presenting regularly and demanding to see a doctor.

What was fuelling this anxiety? Poverty? Social alienation? Isolation? Debt? Domestic violence? Longterm debility?

The idea of the Pantry evolved as a place where people in a desperate situation could work their way back into their usual lifestyle with help which was tailored to their individual problems. The very eloquent Carol lones, who spends most of her time fundraising for the project, was keen to point out that the Pantry model is not the same as a Food Bank. Although it certainly is a place where people in trouble can get food at affordable prices, the Pantry offers counselling on controlling a budget, cooking cheaply and general home management.

All the families and individuals who are on The Vale Pantry's books can visit once a week and pay £7. For this they can select two "red" items (high-priced commodities such as meat and cheese), six "green" items (foods in tins and packets) and as many "free" items as they like (fruit and vegetables) Obviously the user's fee doesn't cover the whole cost and the shortfall is made up from donations and fundraising. Supermarkets donate end-of-day items and surplus stock which are collected every evening by volunteers who then prepare the display for the next day. There can be no doubting the zeal of the volunteers.

Between them they have helped a large number of local families membership year. back onto their feet so that they are no longer reliant on the Pantry, but they are still working with 365 unhappy and desperate families Our Guest Speaker Edward Parker travelled down from Cheltenham (994 people all told) who need their care.

The holistic approach seems to be working and Vale Pantry plans to move to larger premises on the Butts Pond Estate where they can hold elementary cookery classes for harassed mums and prepare breakfasts for children who would otherwise go to school hungry.

The Vale Pantry welcomes all sorts of donations, not just food: toys, soap, shampoo, - anything a destitute family would like and find useful. In February our topic is "Greek Dancing" which Yiannis Tsenicos will explain and, hopefully, demonstrate.
