STURMINSTER NEWTON MEDICAL CENTRE



At the time of writing (Mid March), two GPs and other clinical and admin staff were off work, having tested positive for Covid. In fact, more Practice staff have been off with Covid over the past two months, than at any stage during the pandemic. So the message clearly is, it hasn't gone away. Some interesting statistics:

In the month of February alone there were:

- 5000 call backs to patients from a GP or Advanced Nurse Practitioner, which resulted in 2000 face to face appointments
- 742 online eConsult's were submitted, resulting in 100 face to face appointments
- 44 Patients failed to turn up for a GP or Advanced Nurse appointment
- 588 patients were referred into Secondary Care
- and of those, 125 were urgent cancer '2 week wait' referrals
- 8300 Prescriptions were issued
- And there were 1000 appointments with the Wellbeing team

The number of people wanting appointments and advice from the Practice is at an all time high. It's really important that if you have any health concerns that you have the right care, in the right place and at the right time. However, that doesn't always have to be with a GP or other clinician - there are other avenues, which might actually be much more appropriate and quicker for your needs.

1 in 4 GP appointments are taken up by non-clinical issues - social problems like loneliness and isolation, debt, housing, family troubles, work or unemployment - these are important issues that affect physical and mental health and social prescribing can help to solve or ease many of these.

The Practice Wellbeing Team, includes Social Prescribers, Health and Wellbeing Coaches, Mental Health Gateway workers and a Care Coordinator - all working together to provide the best service to the community. Phone the Practice or email bypsocialprescribing@dorsetgp. nhs.uk

The Pharmacy. As qualified healthcare professionals, Pharmacists can offer clinical advice and over-the-counter medicines for a range of minor illnesses, such as coughs, colds, sore throats, tummy trouble and aches and pains.

If symptoms suggest it's something more serious, pharmacists have the right training to make sure you get the help you need. For example they will tell you if you need to see a GP, nurse or other healthcare professional.

All pharmacists train for 5 years in the use of medicines. They are also trained in managing minor illnesses and providing health and wellbeing advice.

Steps2Wellbeing can help people registered with a Dorset GP practice for a range of common mental health conditions...

Feeling low, anxious, sad or stressed? Research shows that you're not alone. More than one in four people in the UK will struggle at some point with their mental health. This can lead to feelings of hopelessness and despair. Poor mental health can also impact on your quality of life, affecting your work, relationships and physical health.

Steps2Wellbeing offer a range of evidence-based therapy services for common mental health problems, helping you to feel better. The website gives more information and you can contact them directly - you don't need to be referred by your GP. www.steps2wellbeing.co.uk or Tel - 0300 790 6828

Mental Health Connection is a round-the-clock helpline for people of all ages, anywhere in Dorset, who are experiencing mental health problems and need support. Call 0800 652 0190 or NHS 111 for free.

Citizens Advice are available every Monday at the Sturminster Newton Medical Centre, where representatives from the CAB offer pre-booked appointments. To book a slot, contact Reception.

NHS Waiting Times The NHS has launched a website to enable patients to see how long the average wait time for treatment is at hospitals across England. The Practice has no information or influence over this, therefore they have no idea where a patient might be on the waiting list. So the website is to help manage patient expectations when being referred for treatment.

www.myplannedcare.nhs.uk gives patients access to their hospital's waiting times. Log on, choose the hospital where you have been referred to and you can then view the average waiting times.

PPG - the Practice has a very active Patient Participation Group, a group patients of the surgery who want to help it work as well as it can for patients, doctors and staff. The Steering Group meets every six weeks and is looking for a secretary - someone who could take minutes and send out newsletters by email. 

BISHOP ANDREW'S MONTHLY LETTER



Earlier this week I was asked by a group of Year 7 school pupils what church was 'for' and what is was 'like'. I responded that church was 'a rehearsal space for the kingdom of heaven'. following this somewhat baffling description by explaining

how my favourite part of secondary school was the annual school play: the thrill of belonging to a cast and working together for a final production. The plays and musicals (Bugsy Malone being my first, I recall) were like a heightened version of everyday life and regearsing them took much commitment, collaboration, and hilarity.

Church does seem to me almost like that: the place where we enact the drama of salvation, learning the words and ways that help us to know and play our part in the Christian story. The congregation isn't the audience but invited into the cast - just as Jesus called disciples not simply to watch and appreciate him, but to 'go and do likewise'.

Lent is offered as a time of intensive practice for Christ's coming Kingdom: a season for adopting, or deepening, the habits of faith and learning our role as Christians before a watching world. These weeks, culminating in the dramatic events of Passiontide and Easter, ask a great deal from us, but are eternally rewarding. See you at rehearsals!

VILLAGE CHURCHES EASTER MESSAGE



My peace I leave with you...

As I write there are peace talks taking place between representatives of the Ukranian and Russian governments following the further invasion of Ukraine on 24th February by Russian forces.

There was an impassioned plea from Pope Francis on Sunday 13th March. At the conclusion of the Sunday Angelus, Pope Francis recalled that the faithful had just prayed to the Virgin Mary, as the city that bears her name, Mariupol, has "become a city of martyrs in the terrible war ravaging Ukraine." The Pope expressed horror over the barbarity of the killing of children, innocents and unarmed civillians, and called for an end to the unacceptable armed aggression, before it reduces cities to cemeteries.

"In the name of God, let the cries of those who suffer be heard and let the bombings and attackes cease! Let there be a real and decisive focus on negotiation, and let the humanitarian corridors be effective and safe. In the name of God, I ask you: stop this massacre... God is only God of peace" he said.

In his earthly ministry Jesus Christ didn't mask the symptoms of a world in turmoil but sought to deal with the causes or turmoil. Furthermore Jesus was - and is - the one who promises a *new* world, a new heaven and a new earth, rather than simply trying to fix the old one. This is called the Kingdom of God for which we pray in the Lord's Prayer - *on earth as it is in heaven*.

The peace that Jesus speaks of in the Gospels is the Hebrew concept of peace as *wholeness*, of being "at one" with God and with our neighbours - and ourselves; of having not only an absence of war, but of having the causes of war - greed, hate, fear, and their children - injustice, intolerance, and prejudices - eliminated; of having not only an absence of pain and distress, but of having the disease that causes the pain and distress cured. And that is what Jesus was about when he walked among us, what drew massive crowds to see and hear him and what has motivated his followers, ordinary people to do extraordinary things for over 2000 years and what he is about through His presence today.

In the evening of the first Easter Day, the risen Jesus came among his grieving friends after they had witnessed him dying the most gruesome death and being buried in another's tomb, he greeted them with the words *Peace be with you*. John 20:19

He could have miraculously obliterated his wounds after he was raised from the tomb, but chose not to. He bore the marks of his wounds into the presence of his disciples. And Jesus speaks of peace into our deeply wounded world today.

The words of Jesus concerning his peace are not easy words and his peace is not always peace to receive, but it is a peace that lasts, a peace that triumphs, a peace that heals, and thay is not something that the world can give us, it can only come to us from God.

THE VERY REVD NICHOLAS PAPADOPULOS, DEAN OF SALISBURY



"We will all die".

Those were the words of a taxi driver who drove me from the airport into central Beirut in October last year. I had asked him what he thought the future held for the Lebanese people.

Perhaps I should have expected a blunt response. An uneasy peace has prevailed in Lebanon since the end of its bloody civil war in 1990. But this was put under immense pressure by the outward ripples of the financial crisis of 2008, and by the explosion in the port of Beirut which ripped the city apart in 2020. Its economy badly mismanaged; its politics corrupt and ineffective; swathes of its territory controlled by Hezbollah: it is difficult for the Lebanese people to be hopeful, and it is difficult to be hopeful for them.

I remembered my taxi driver's words when - still in the depths of this cruellest of all seasons of Lent - I began to think about writing this Easter letter. President Putin attacked Ukraine barely one week after Ash Wednesday, and many of us have found it impossible to think of anything but the suffering of the Ukranians ever since. Their cities under seige; their neighbours forced to flee; their children taking up arms: it is difficult to be hopeful for them.

Of course, in both Lebanon and in Ukraine glimpses of hope are clearly visible. In Beirut the streets are full as people meet, drink the best coffee in the Levant, eat kebabs, converse, and go about their business. The graffiti is poignant: Martyr's Square contains portraits of the 200+ citizens who were killed in the 2020 blast, bearing the hashtag 'They Matter'. We hear similar stories from the cellars and trenches of Kyiv and from Ukraine's other cities, stories of great courage and great compassion. Faced with desperate odds men and women retain their humanity; they dig deep and discover the resilience that they need to help them survive.

But these are only glimpses. What about secure and lasting hope for Lebanon, for Ukraine, for South Sudan, for Syria? Contrary to my taxi driver's fatalistic resignation the Easter hope promises that "We will not all die, but we will be changed". Where is that hope to be found in these acutely distressed corners of our world?

I have no answer. All I can do is read the Easter story again. All I can do is remember that on Palm Sunday the disciples of Jesus surely had no thought whatever of his imminent arrest and trial. All I can do is remember that on Good Friday they surely had no thought whatever of the future of their mission - no thought at all beyond the cold, solid certainties of his deadly wounds and the rock-hewn tomb. All I can do is remember that on the first Easter morning their earth-shattering realization that Jesus lived must have been beyond description - a new reality that none of them had imagine or foreseen.

I think that's what hope looks like - this Lent.

ST GREGORY'S CHURCH REDEVELOPMENT PROJECT

As well all know the last two years have been very tricky for everyone, not least the church and Covid has caused difficult of not, for some, heart breaking circumstances. Ably led by our vicar, the Reverend Gaenor Hockey, despite the disciplines required - masks, sanitizing, social distancing, no singing of hymns or chants - she has led the services with a modified format for Communion, and though services progressed satisfactorily, the thought of slowly back to a normal routine is encouraging.

New Church Wardens have been appointed, namely Pat Budden and Nick Lalor who have taken up their duties enthusiastically. Special thanks go to Stephen Sides and Elleanor Woodhouse, their predecessors. Stephen

retired, as required after a statutory period in post, having been a stalwart leader especially whilst also participating in the choir.

Sadly, during the Pandemic St Gregory's lost two people who were stalwarts of the Church's activities, they being the redoubtable Peter Colebrook and the entertaining Dave Treaby who provided regular cover for services during periods of Inter Regnum. He was also a terrific enthusiast for Bath Rugby Club, so thank goodness he did not live to witness their terrible collapse in form during the 2021/22 season!

In the meantime the restructuring (re-ordering) project is progressing. There is a display set up at the back of the Church, near the Font, outlining all the proposals with progress so far. The overall cost of the project will be in the region of £500,000 because some work that is needed is mandatory like re-wiring, an upgrade to kitchen space and a proper toilet suitable for fit and disabled people. The Church's uneven and, in parts, dangerous flooring requires major improvement (it is on several levels at the moment) when there might be the possibility of under floor heating. Brighter lighting is essential to a space that is aimed at creating a more user friendly environment for worship and socialising. The aim is to make St Gregory's into a Community friendly space both for worship and leisure activities hopefully also stimulating greater interest in joining the congregation of the Church that is Marnhull's iconic feature.

Some preparation has been done during the past 10 or so years, including the installation of a digital organ and keyboard, an already improved lighting system that still needs re-siting, the weather vane restored to the tower, the installation of a new Porch lantern, the exposure of historic wall paintings, a clear out of roof space to help rewiring, plus preparation of scale drawings and display panels. The fundamental need now is to find a project manager who will be somebody with construction experience and the time to organise the day to day work required for this ambitious project. In the meantime a fund raising programme is being prepared both locally and with organisations able to grant some substantial funds.

MARNHULL WOMEN'S INSTITUTE

About two hundred and fifty million years ago during the Triassic geological period, a thick layer of reddish desert sand was laid down somewhere in Pangaa and compressed into rock. Over the next few million years climate change and tectonic shift translated that same spot into a humid swamp and a layer of clay and limestone covered the red sandstone. Move on a few more million years and the limestone became the bed of a shallow sea and was covered with the chalky remains of tiny shalls.

A hundred million years ago, therefore, this spot on the earth's surface was a three-layer geological sandwich. At that point a tilting motion began and very gradually the eastern part of the area sank and the western part rose up wards. Wind and weather scoured the upper surface and eventually the three rocky layers lay exposed side by side like a Neopolitan ice cream. And that, in a nutshell, is what makes the Jurassic Coast of Dorset a World Heritage Site to which geologists from all over the world come in pilgrimage.

Steve Belasco is a free-lance photographer who has a mission to record the 96 miles of Jurassic Coast in all weathers and seasons. He recognises that to view the land from a boat at sea can be best way to capture the beauty and the structure of the coastal scenery and that it can give a perspective often missed by a spectator on the shore.

His photographs are often ravishingly beautiful, frequently surprising and always interesting. Steve's virtual cruise took us from the red sandstone cliffs in the West, past the scores of quarries extracting Portland stone to the white chalk pinnacles of Old Harry Rocks in the east.

He records wildlife including cormorants, seals and friendly dolphins, and he also records the human life of the coast, with sporting sailors, fishermen and holiday makers on the beaches and also the important bunkering operations around Portland and the presence in sheltered Weymouth Bay of huge cruise ships and tankers.

Steve reminded us that "in the maritime business, Dorset punches well above its weight."

MARNHULL MUSIC SOCIETY

The Ladies' Choice programme, compiled and presented by Jo Loukes, produced some very interesting items, several of which were unfamiliar to the audience. It began in rousing style with the third movement of Sibelius' 5th symphony with its swirling menace and majesty. Pavarotti came next with "Che Gelida Manina" from Puccini's La Boheme – very much a favourite and always a joy to hear.

A Chopin Fantasy impromptu followed but – and here was the surprise – played on the clarinet. It was the familiar in an unfamiliar guise and the back row pundits agreed that it was very interesting if not wholly effective. We had the extraordinary voice of Ivan Rebroff singing "Somewhere my love", a Schubert string quintet featuring Pablo Casalls, and the first half ended with Scott Joplin's "Maple Leaf Rag."

After the break we had Murray Perahia playing Beethoven's piano concerto No.3 with an effortless assurance that was inspiring followed by part of Bruch's Scottish Fantasy – not the movement we knew but an interesting suggestion of traditional Scottish tunes that appeared and vanished eerily throughout the piece.

The traditional "Li Novais Tens" and "Saltarello" were wholly unfamiliar but delightfully antique-sounding tunes played on the Gaelic harp and a medley of bells and drums. Mozart's "Don Giovanni", Elgar's "Serenade for Strings" and a warm helping of Ella Fitzgerald rounded off a most interesting and illuminating evening. The concert on April 19th is Gentlemen's Choice and our gentlemen members are challenged to produce a programme as varied and melodic as the Ladies. Please give your selections to Colin.

NEWS FROM DORSET TRADING STANDARDS

Knowing more about what's in your food.

With the easing of Covid restrictions many people will now be eating meals out and will start to notice changes to the way that their food is described.

In the past, food and drink from places such as cafes, restaurants, pubs and takeaways were not required to display nutritional information. This made it difficult for consumers to make informed and healthier choices about the food they were buying.

From April 2022, new legislation will require large businesses with over 250 employees to display accurate calorie information at the point where a customer chooses their food. Information can be provided on physical menus, online menus, or labels.

The types of businesses covered can include:

Restaurants, fast food outlets, cafes, pubs and supermarkets.

Home delivery services

 $Cafes and \, take aways \, within \, larger \, shops \, and \, venues, such as \, supermarkets, \, department \, stores, \, and \, entertainment \, venues \, such \, as \, cinemas.$

Specialist food stores, delicatessens, sweet shops and bakeries.

Contract catering for example for events and canteens.

Domestic transport businesses including planes, trains and ferries.

The changes are part of the Government's strategy to tackle obesity. Having access to accurate calorie information about food and drink ordered will make it easier for consumers to make healthier food choices for themselves and their families when eating out.

Dorset Council Trading Standards will be working with businesses to help them to better understand the changes needed. If you find something you feel is false or misleading please contact Trading Standards by calling the Citizens Advice Consumer Service on 0808 223 1133.

Sturminster Choral Society will perform Rossini's Petite Messe Solennelle at St Mary's Church Sturminster Newton on Saturday 7th May at 7:30pm. The Choral Society are this year celebrating 60 years of singing in and around Sturminster Newton. It has also been two years since their last full concert due to Covid restrictions. They are delighted to present this most engaging and uplifting piece of music written by one of the giants of the music world.

Gioachino Antonio Rossini (1792 - 1868), born in Italy, began to compose by the age of 12. Apart form his many pieces of set music, he gained fame for his 39 operas, including The Barber of Seville and William Tell. He set new standards for both comic and serious opera before retiring from large-scale composition while still in his thirties and at the height of his popularity.

One of Rossini's few late works, intended to be given in public, was his Petite Messe Solennelle, composed in 1863 and first performed in the following year 1864.

For this performance the choir will be conducted by their musical director Annemarie Lees, accompanied by Caroline De'Cruz on piano and Tracy Kennington on harmonium, with soloists Anna Gregory (soprano), Charlotte Collier (alto), Kieran White (tenor) and Pauls Putnins (bass).






- 16 Peas 4 pods of one variety

- 17 Potatoes (any kind) 3 of one variety
- 18 Tomatoes (small) 3 not exceeding 35mm in diameter
- 19 Tomatoes (medium) 3 between 35mm 75mm in diameter
- 20 Tomatoes 1 truss any stage of ripeness and colour
- 21 Novice only. Any vegetable one pair. The exhibitor must not have won 1st, 2nd or 3rd in any previous Marnhull Flower Show Vegetable Division.
- 22 Pair of any other vegetables. Must be grown in the parish of Marnhull.
- 23 Collection of 5 garden herbs in water.

Fruit

- 24 Dish of 3 different kinds of fruit
- 25 Bowl of one kind of soft fruit
- 26 Three stalks of Rhubarb

Vegetable Oddities

- 27 Heaviest marrow
- 28 Heaviest Onion
- 29 Longest runner bean
- 30 Oddest shaped vegetable (as grown)

MARNHULL HORSE RIDERS



Any horse lover knows the joy and benefit of spending time with these majestic creatures that we so love, and as former British Prime Minister Winston Churchill once said so eloquently. "There is something about the outside of a horse that is good for the inside of a man."

Never a truer word was spoken. So, what is it about horses that has such an impact on us? From the physical benefits, with horse riding working more muscles than you ever knew you had, to the emotive benefits of spending time in the stable after a really tough day.

I have recently started volunteering at the Bryanston RDA (Riding for the Disabled) so one morning a week we hold 30 minute sessions with about 15 riders in total. As an older, very experienced horsewoman, this has taken me to a place I have not yet experienced in my life.

I already feel an emotional connection with the horses - so very big, quiet and gentle. But now, this is combined with a strong desire to help as best I can the parents, carers and friends who come along with their children or patients, to have a ride. One older lady takes two buses and walks with her son to bring him from Shaftesbury.

Along with traditional pyschotherapy, activities involving horses can help people suffering from a range of mental health conditions, including depression and ADHD. BEing on horseback helps people by stimulating the body and mind (sensory and motor skills), which makes this form of therapy quite board in what it can be helpful for.

It takes concentration to remain balanced on horseback, and the natural reflex of trying to stay balanced doesn't only help with muscle development, the level of concentration required boosts brain activity.

The same riders come most weeks to the RDA, they often laugh and pat their horse, some sit on top and can't keep their eyes open due to the movement of the horse. Several come in wheelchairs and are pushed up the ramp to the top of the mounting block.

Experienced volunteers carefully lift them onto the saddle, adjust their stirrups and check all is well before they move off. Everyone is different and some have extremely complicated disabilities. I feel very humbled to be involved and part of their lives whilst enjoying one of the passions liove.

This is Rosa, she was an experienced rider until she had an accident 6 years ago and now is in a wheelchair. Gorgeous Captain and the whole team definitely made her day a whole lot better. Thank you to Rosa for sharing her pictures.
