Some Practice statistics

From January to mid May 2023 – 99.3% of available appointments were booked – a total of 23,964. Of those, 63% were face to face and 37% were telephone. However 3.4% - 384 patients failed to turn up for their appointment and 34 did not answer their 'phone.

Amongst those, 254 were GP appointments and 131 were with Advance Care Practitioners. These are appointments that could have been used by other patients, however the cost of the time wasted when these patients didn't take up their appointment, comes to \pounds 4630.57.

If you are unable to keep an appointment, please cancel it as soon as possible, so that the time can be offered to another patient. If you have the facility, you should be able to cancel if you receive a text and on the NHS app. Otherwise, please telephone the Practice.

Klinik continues to reduce the number of telephone calls to the Practice. If you have online access, Klinik is easy to find on the Blackmore Vale Partnership website – click on 'Online Services' or scroll down to the Klinik tab. It is a quick and efficient way of accessing care and advice and receiving a prompt and appropriate response. To order repeat medication, then please use SystmOnline or the NHS app.

The Wellbeing Team

This is made up of social prescribers, mental health peer support workers, mental health nurse, health coach, with plans to employ a young person's social prescriber, psychological wellbeing practitioners and amazing patient volunteers. The team can be contacted on 01747 856786 or email bvpwellbeing@dorsetgp.nhs.uk

Carousel Clinic

The practice uses population health methodology to identify people at risk of falls, and reduced mobility alongside social factors such as isolation and increased vulnerability and invites them to this one stop clinic. It's a busy time with the opportunity to speak with a number of health professionals such as a pharmacist and an Occupational Therapy assistant as well as representatives from a number of voluntary groups inc Age UK.

Over 300 patients have been seen with outcomes including reduced numbers of medications, referrals for ECG's and mobility and home aid reviews, as well as significant numbers of social prescribing referrals, and support for carers and family members. The feedback is incredibly positive.

Falls Buddies

Volunteers are trained in balance and strengthening exercises and mindfulness and are matched with a person identified as a person at high risk of falls and goals are set by the person.

Positive Movement Group People identified from the above work are offered the opportunity to engage in a group led by a yoga coach focusing on improving strength, balance and confidence. The practice has supported those who cannot financially afford the sessions through small personal health budgets. The first group of 22 have given remarkable feedback confirming improved confidence when moving around.

iPads from the Library

Would you, or someone you know benefit from being able to borrow an iPad for up to 6 weeks? If so, then you can borrow one through Dorset Libraries.

The scheme is designed for anyone over 18 and a full member of the Dorset Library Service, ideally looking for employment, including those who have little or no previous experience of using an iPad or tablet. These are available in several libraries, the closest to us, being Blandford. All iPads come with data, so you don't need to have internet access at home and they come with a combined keyboard case and a stereo

headset. They are user friendly and have ready loaded links to websites with information about:

- employment, writing a CV and interview skills
- money, claiming benefits and maintaining a Universal Credit claim
- health and wellbeing
- computing skills





MARNHULL WOMENS' INSTITUTE

Andrew McElwee, a retired National Trust administrator, amused the WI with talk of his total (alleged) unpreparedness for this role, and his hapless adventures in it. He and his wife went from a 3 bedroom house in Canterbury to live in Polesden Lacey, a 1,600 acre estate in Surrey, the former home of an Edwardian hostess and friend of the late Queen Mother, who spent part of her honeymoon there. It had about 3,500 visitors per year.

He was in charge of all the staff, from volunteers to gardeners, curators, foresters among others, for which his former life as a surveyor had not given much guidance. He told, among other things, of having a bedroom the size of a football pitch, with bathroom adjoining but the toilet miles away down a long corridor (not helpful in the early hours!). And an enormous bath without a bathplug, instead he found there was an old Christmas pudding bowl, with ancient pudding still in, which fitted the hole exactly.

He spoke of tribulations with Animal Rights Protestors who planned to interrupt the London Mozart players concert in the grounds – because the finale had fireworks! The local police were most helpful, sending double their normal contingent i.e. 2 officers. As it happened, an enormous thunderstorm save the day but not anyone from getting soaked! The Lord works in mysterious ways.

He said that the one thing that the National Trust has, which no other organisation does, is an expert in everything, which was helpful when the house fire alarm system need to be upgraded; following which a large (protected species) of bat got loose and set every alarm off in the early hours. His most trying experience was when he asked, at the end of a staff meeting for any questions, and the one raised was "why no cake in the staff room?". We didn't hear the result of that.

It was obvious he enjoyed his time at the Trust, and his talk entertained us. The next meeting is "Farming from the Soil Upwards", and is an Open Meeting. Visitors are always welcome. July 10th. in the Village Hall.


"Talking Heads" in the Village Hall

The children also saw their designs put into action recently when they built their own model-sized sustainable houses. They worked hard to plan the steps they would like, organise the materials needed and overcome hurdles they may face along the way.







MARNHULL MUSIC SOCIETY

Glenda Frazer's first presentation was a jewel-box of beautiful things. She opened in rousing style with Mozart's 4th Horn Concert played by Dennis Brain in a recording for which she has scoured the archives. A contrast came with the husky voice of Edith Piaf singing her iconic "Non, je ne regretted rien."

Surely this must spark some private image in everyone's subconscious. We had Beethoven's "Archduke" and the compelling voice of Janet Baker singing "Le Spectre del la Rose" before settling down to listen to the 3rd movement of Schubert's quintet in C. Starting with its gentle melody punctuated by high-bird-like notes it later evolves into vigorous life before reverting to the original tune.

Then Glenda surprised us with a most attractive jangly little piece called "Babiko" which she heard in Prague in 1961 just as the Berlin Wall was going up. It was a plea for grandma to teach her grand-daughter to dance the charleston and it had a charmingly honky-tonk air. Glenda ended the first half with a peerless recording of itzhak Periman playing the Beethoven violin concerto.

The second half began in stirring manner with Bach's ever-popular Toccaca and Fugue and then there was another evocative taste of France with the seductive voice of Yves Montand singing "Fallen Leaves." The Koh-i-noor of this sparkling evening came next, for me at least. Glenda had chosen Jaqueline do Pre playing part of Elgar's cello concerto in the matchless recording with Sir John Barbirolli. This was a sublime moment and the audience was entranced.

Every jewel box contains a bit of bling and this was the next revelation. In an authentically scratchy recording we heard the great Caruso in florid voice singing that musical postcard of Venice: "O Sole Mio." Joyously extravagant stuff! In contrast the Bach Double Concerto featuring David and Igor Oistrach was compelling and gorgeous.

Bryn Terfel singing a Schubert song and the splendidly picturesque "VI-tava" by Smetana, with the swirling currents and diamond glints of sunlight on the ripples ended a splendid evening of music.

Glenda's concert was a masterclass in balance and selection and we all hope she will be persuaded to compile another programme before too long. We have no meeting in July but members are reminded that we will have our annual garden party in August.

ROOFTOPS AND CAR PARKS CAN POWER THE COUNTRY

Majority of required solar capacity could be installed unobtrusively on existing buildings and car parks, with almost universal public support Decarbonising the grid requires far less land than previously feared, after rooftop solar potential was analysed and quantified for a new report Installing solar panels should be a requirement of planning permission – for all car parks, new buildings and major renovations.

Over half of the solar panels required to hit government net zero targets could be fitted on rooftops and car parks, a major new report for CPRE, the countryside charity, has found. The research, by the UCL Energy Institute, shows that decarbonising the grid requires far less land than previously feared.

The government is advised to set a national rooftop solar target of at least 40GW by 2035. Installing solar panels unobtrusively on existing buildings and car parks would enjoy near universal public support and help minimise objections to large solar farms in the countryside, the report says. The potential of urban brownfield sites to generate renewable energy is being dramatically underutilised at present.

A series of crises, including energy security, food security, climate change, nature recovery and housing, have placed the countryside under intense pressure. The report concludes that, in order to transition to renewable energy in the timeframe required, there is no alternative but to accept ground mounted solar projects will be necessary. However, it offers hope that valuable landscapes can be protected, the need for additional large greenfield schemes gradually removed, and contentious planning disputes avoided if rooftop solar is prioritised.

The government has set a national target of 70GW of solar energy generation by 2035. The independent review analysed and quantified the solar photovoltaic capacity of rooftops and car parks across England, providing an assessment of the total energy that could be generated.

The key findings are:

Installing solar panels on existing rooftops and other land such as car parks could provide at least 40-50GW in England by 2035; and

Longer term to 2050, and with further investment, there is potential for up to 117GW of low carbon electricity to be generated from roofs and other developed spaces.

CPRE is calling on the government to ensure all suitable new buildings have rooftop solar as standard. Regulations should be updated so that solar capacity is a requirement of planning permission for major refurbishments and new residential, commercial and industrial buildings.

Roger Mortlock, chief executive of CPRE, the countryside charity, said:

'We are missing a trick in failing to install more solar panels on roofs and car parks. Rooftop solar has almost universal public support. It's unobtrusive and largely out of the line of sight, which means less objections and a speedier passage through the planning system.

'Given the urgency of the climate crisis, it's time that renewables are fitted as standard on all new development. Homeowners expect it on new homes and it's crazy to see massive new warehouses, with roofs the size of football pitches, waved through without any expectation they install rooftop solar.

'The planning system is stuck in the fossil fuel age without a plan for net zero. The first step must be all new buildings and major renovations requiring solar panels as a condition of planning permission unless there are strong reasons not to.'

If the government fails to kickstart a rooftop solar revolution an area of countryside larger than the size of Greater London will be required for ground-mounted schemes. CPRE's view is that this land could be much better used for either nature recovery, public access or low impact food production; or a mixture of these.

With the right policies, rooftop solar could hand power back to the people. A decentralised future of renewable energy cooperatives sprouting up in communities across the country, supported by the government, is a realistic option in a net zero world.

The report's key recommendations to reach the government target of 70GW of solar energy by 2035 include:

A new rooftop solar target: at least 40GW by 2035 delivered through the lowest cost opportunities on new builds, commercial buildings and car parks; Land use framework: a national strategy to balance the competing needs for buildings, carbon sequestration, energy and infrastructure, food security and nature recovery on a finite amount of land;

'Roof first': local communities can audit solar potential on available south-facing roofs, following the example of Kendal Town Council in the Lake District, and then will be able to prioritise solar panels on suitable brownfield land and avoid best and most versatile agricultural land; and Grid capacity: work with Ofgem to require Distribution Network Operators across the country to invest in local grid capacity to better accommodate increased generation from solar and heat pumps.

Rupert Hardy, Chair North Dorset CPRE, said:

'We want our government to adopt a renewables strategy that prioritises rooftops, surface car parks and brownfield sites in a concerted effort to attract wide public support. Grid capacity issues need to be resolved too. If implemented quickly, the policy could reduce energy bills during the cost-of-living crisis and speed up the transition to net zero, while leaving as much countryside as possible available for farming and nature restoration. Much hinges on the promised government solar road map.'

FAMILY RAISING MONEY FOR STARS APPEAL AT WALK FOR WARDS AFTER HOSPITAL SAVE BABY SON'S LIFE

A Fordingbridge family is taking part in the Stars Appeal's Walk for Wards after staff at Salisbury Hospital saved their baby's life.

Shelley and Chris Perkins' two-week-old son Taylor was brought into Salisbury District Hospital in October 2022 after he suddenly became very

When he arrived on the children's ward his condition soon worsened and the situation became critical as doctors had to resuscitate baby Taylor, who was later found to have a heart defect that was restricting the blood flow from his heart.

"It was terrifying," recalls mum Shelley, who says Taylor was so unwell when they arrived on Sarum Children's Ward.

"Within five or 10 minutes there were over a dozen people working on him. They saved his life."

Baby Taylor, who is now seven-months-old, had to go to Southampton for surgery but has since been admitted to the Sarum Ward at Salisbury Hospital several times when he was ill over winter and visits regularly for help with his feeding tube.

Shelley praised the "amazing" Salisbury Hospital staff who treated Taylor and continue to care for him and says that "each time we have been looked after so well and are so grateful to everyone on the ward".

Donations to the Stars Appeal fund enhancements to the furnishings, décor and artwork on the Sarum Ward along with multi-sensory toys and other play equipment, as well as diagnostic, treatment and rehabilitation equipment.

The charity also provides free accommodation for families which include a dedicated parents' flat and pull-down beds so parents can stay by their child's bedside in hospital.

Shelley added: "When we were there I was able to stay with him in the beds provided by the Stars Appeal. I don't know what I would have done without that."

Taylor is doing well but will have to have more operations in the future. Speaking about the hospital staff that saved her son's life, she added: "If they hadn't have done what they did we wouldn't be in the position to have Taylor with us anymore.

'We wanted to be able to do something to help other people that might be in our situation."

This will be the first time Shelley and Chris are taking part in Walk for Wards. They are going to be raising money for Sarum Children's Ward. 

Three-year-old Erin Goddard, who was born with a cleft lip and palate, has inspired her family to raise money for the Stars Appeal to support other children being treated at Salisbury District Hospital.

The Goddard family are going to be supporting the Hospital's Spires Cleft Centre and Sarum Children's Ward at the Stars Appeal's Walk for Wards on Sunday, July 9 at Wilton House.

Erin was born with a bilateral cleft lip and palate and has been cared for at the Spires Cleft Centre at the Hospital. The centre is a specialist unit caring for children with cleft lip and/or palate, which is a gap or split in the upper lip and/or the roof of the mouth.

Her mum Amanda said: "Erin was diagnosed at our 20-week scan. It was a very scary and stressful time full of tests and lots of scans but immediately we were offered the opportunity to speak with a cleft nurse from the team and given much needed reassurance and support.

"Erin has so far had three operations, each lasting up to six hours and thankfully each was just an overnight stay. She's doing so well, her speech is a little delayed, but it's coming with the help of the speech therapists." After her operations Erin has stayed overnight with her mum on Sarum Children's Ward.

"The caring staff took time to make us feel important and not just another patient even throughout lockdowns and staff pressures," added Amanda, from Stalbridge in Dorset, who will be doing the 5k walk with her husband Matthew and their daughters Erin and 10-year-old Faye.

"We are so grateful for all of the support we have had and will continue to have in the future. We continue to have amazing support from all of the Cleft team and know that whenever we have any issues the support is there.




