



Taking the Environment Around Marnhull Seriously

Ut's been a busy few weeks for the Marnhull Green Teams. If you came along to the 'Our Rivers and Streams' event in the Village Hall you will have heard Kim Creswell speak about the work of Queen Thorne NAture Watch, who are collecting evidence on the lack of wildlife in local streams and the contribution of agro-chemicals to that loss; while Liz Bonnell and Julie Hillier explained the River Stour water guardian project organised by Wessex Water and Dorset Wildlife Trust.

According to the Parliamentary Environmental Audit Committee, only 14% of English rivers have good ecological status, with pollution from agriculture, sewage, roads and single-use plastics contributing to a dangerous 'chemical cocktail' coursing through our waterways. Not a single river in England has received a clean bill of health for chemical contamination.

The second Marnhull Giveaway & Takeaway Day was also a considerable success. Very many thanks to all who made it work - John Dowsett the coordinator in particular!

Our G&T Days seek to encourage the Re-use part of the Reduce, Re-use, Recycle response to the ongoing environmental crisis. The idea is to contribute to waste avoidance by bringing unwanted goods into new ownership. This time we had 21 Giveaway venues around the village and - although donations were entirely voluntary - we raised £235 for the Dorset Wildlife Trust. There will be another G&T Day at about the same time next year.

Chris Hilder led a fine Dawn Chorus Walk in early May. The early risers who accompanied him heard 26 different species of bird and saw around 140 individuals - plus three mammals: a fox, a rabbit, and a roe deer. Thank vou, Chris!

Now: Marnhull Green Teams' next big event will be 'Let's Get Pumping', at the Village Hall on Tuesday 20 June, starting at 7:30pm. No - it's not some sort of keep fit class.. Following on from our successful 'Going Solar' events last year, which began with villagers sharing their experience of solar panels, 'Let's Get Pumping' will be all about heat pumps. Neighbours who have installed various types of heat pump will be there to talk about them and answer guestions - but please remember that this is an experience-sharing evening: our speakers are not heat pump engineers, and this is not a sales event.

Subjects we hope to include will be:
An introduction to Heat Pumps

- An air-to-air heat pump in a small home
- A domestic air-source heat pump in a modern-build house
- The ground-source heat pump installation at St Gregory's Primary School; and
- A domestic ground-source heat pump in an older house
- A Q&A session

Entry is free and refreshments will be available.

In other news, Marnhull Green Teams have joined Garden Organic. This gives us access to a community of like-minded organic gardeners via the members-only area on their website, with lots of advice and information on growing organically and sustainably. We will also be supporting research into organic growing methods via citizen science projects and, via Garden Organic's heritage seeds library, the preservation of genetic diversity in food plants. We will be able to obtain free seeds, and discounts on courses and talks. 
RECYCLE AT THE HUB


MARNHULL MEN'S SHED



MARNHULL ON NATIONAL RADIO MAY 2023



BBC Radio 4 Question Time Comes to Marnhull

It started with Elaine Spencer White seeing a request for village halls that had just had a makeover, to celebrate the upgrade, by hosting BBC Radio 4's Current affairs programme, Question Time. She asked Jean and Peter McErlain, who said "Well, could you please apply." After getting a positive

response from the BBC, Elaine handed it back to Jean and Peter, who with the rest of the Village Hall Committee, organized the packed-out event on Friday 12 May.

"Please arrive from 6:30pm and take your seat by 7:15pm" was the first instruction on the tickets. By 6:15pm,

the hall was half full! At 6:30pm, a man from BBC Radio Solent came out to "Warm Up" the audience. His first question was: "How many of you here listen to Radio Solent every day?"

A deafening silence followed, so he tried again; "How many of you have listened to Radio Solent ever." He explained the history of Question Time and covered some "rules". These included no booing, or heckling. We then practiced clapping. We went from Grade 1. Yes, we agree, good response (Polite clapping) to Grade 5. Brilliant answer, that we all fully agree with (Loud clapping, cheers and whoops encouraged).

Fifteen minutes to broadcast time and the producer came out to introduce her team and explain the programme format. The people whose questions had been selected were announced. They were moved to the front row of seats in order of play. This included the Warm Up question from Ann Davis-Penson. Ten minutes to broadcast and Alex Forsyth, the Question Time presenter and chair led the panel from the Green Room (the Village Hall kitchen) around the outside of the Hall and in through the pavilion to take their seats on the stage.

Alex introduced everyone and then asked Ann to read out her question about superpowers and how you would use them. The panel answered to test sound levels and we were all ready to go as the pip's sounded and we listened to the Radio 4 Eight O'Clock News on the sound system speaker. Alex Forsyth then took her cue and we were live on national radio.

I strongly suggest that you go on to BBC Sounds and listen to the programme and form your own opinion of the debate. The panel consisted of Minette Batters NFU President, Dame Meg Hillier MP for Hackney South and Shoreditch (Lab) Chair Public Accounts Committee, Danny Kruger MP (Con) MP for Device Wilts and Danny Sriskandarajah, Chief Executive of Oxfam UK.

Questions included Heather Crocker on access to NHS GP face-to-face appintments, Geoffrey Horton our Community Choir leader, on how to solve the refugee crisis (with an accommodation barge in Portland?) and of course Ann's "Warm Up" question. The question that gained the most reaction from the Marnhull audience was Sue Bailey's. How do you encourage farmers to use farmland for productive use, rather than selling for development?


My lasting impression was the outstanding professionalism and expertise of the Chair, Alex Forsyth. She flawlessly guided the audience and the panel through this live recording (no retakes or rehearsals) with total confidence. She challenged panel members with astute follow up questions and observations. She explained acronyms and had relevant up-to-date facts and statistics on the subjects raised. She directed proceedings with hand and arm gestures that produced a seamless performance from her production team, the panel, questioners and audience.

an 'interesting' time to become a diocesan bishop!






ST MARKS

The April concert consisted of pieces chosen by our gentlemen members and it was compiled and presented by Mike Wilkins. We back-row critics awarded it a resounding five stars for variety, melody and general enjoyment. It began with the superbly evocative "Great Gates of Kiev" from Mussorgsky's Pictures at an Exhibition with the clamorous crowds of hawkers and jostling animals all seen through a haze of dust as they push into the city. Surely there can be few better examples of picturesque composina.

The noise and bustle of Kiev was followed by the tender love song called "Myfanwy" sung by Bryn Terfel, and then by a jaunty little piece which is native to Cameroon called "O Bia" and played by John Williams on the Spanish guitar.

There was a stirring episode from Bach's "St Matthew Passion" sung in English, which is most unusual and a bit of pure romance with the 3rd movement of Tchaikovsky's 5th symphony. The first half ended with the hugely popular 3rd movement of Beethoven's violin concerto.

After the break we had the catering rhythm of the 2nd movement of Mahlers 1st symphony with its suggestion of hunting horns. Perhaps this rural scene is not what the composer intended to portray but it is certainly what springs to my mind. Later came the measured opening to Dvorak's Slavonic Dance which gradually develops into a whirl of high energy and colour.

Gershwin's "Bess, you is my woman now" introduced a guite different tone into the programme and it was followed by another mesmerising favourite in a movement of Mendelssohn's violin concerto with certainly send most of the audience into a trance of delight. A quite novel piano concerto which followed was the work of Czerny and unfamiliar to most of us and which everyone seemed to enjoy.

The evening ended appropriately with the droll, contemplative "Sunset Poem of Eli Jenkins" from Under Milk Wood and sung with great feeling by Bryn Terfel.

STARS APPEAL BENSON SUITE MARKS 10 YEARS OF SUPPORTING BEREAVED PARENTS

A dedicated hospital suite funded by the Stars Appeal has marked 10 years of supporting bereaved parents who tragically experience the loss of their baby.

The Benson Suite at Salisbury District Hospital was opened in 2013 and has supported hundreds of families. It provides a dedicated, private space where bereaved families who lose a baby shortly before or after birth can spend time with their babies and grieve away from the Labour Ward.

The Suite was named in recognition of Sir Christopher and Lady Benson after they donated the funds required to create the Suite by redeveloping part of the Hospital's Maternity Department. Lady Benson sadly passed away last year.

Sir Christopher visited the Suite to mark its 10th anniversary and met with staff and some of the parents who have been supported there.

Thanks to funds raised by families who have been helped by the Benson Suite over the last 10 years, the Stars Appeal also funds a specialist bereavement midwife who is there to support families before, during, and after their time on the Benson Suite and during subsequent pregnancies.

Tamar Vellacott and her partner Cameron Pratt from Salisbury sadly experienced the loss of their baby son Albie in February 2022. They were supported at the Benson Suite and by bereavement midwife Steph Thompson.

Tamar said: "The use of the Benson Suite meant the world to us as we were able to celebrate and grieve the birth and loss of our baby away from the labour ward where new parents were having the best day of their life as we battled through our worst.

The privacy and dignity that the Benson Suite offers is second to none. For a place where so many hearts have broken, we walked out of there feeling supported, loved and that our baby had been born and died surrounded by so many people who cared which is all you could ever want.

While at the Benson Suite they were able to spend time with Albie in a specialist cot in one of the family rooms.

Tamar said: "To be able to tuck him into bed and lie next to him rather than abruptly having him taken away is something I can't explain. I am so grateful to have been given the time we needed to prepare ourselves to say goodbye."

"If we had to deliver Albie on the labour ward I would have felt ten times worse than I did. To hear babies cry when the silence in your room is deafening would have been even more heart-breaking," explains Tamar, who praised the reassuring support from Steph the bereavement midwife and adds: "Her knowledge and empathy will stay with us forever."

Tamar says that "the one thing we can bring from his loss was the love and support surrounding his birth. His birth was beautiful and despite the sheer heartbreak of losing him, there is not a single part of our experience at the Benson Suite that I would ever want to change.

Donations enable the Stars Appeal to continue funding their dedicated bereavement midwife, to maintain and enhance the Benson Suite environment, and provide equipment, visits from Hospital chaplains, photographs and other keepsakes.

Sir Christopher Benson said: "What a privilege, for 10 years, to be associated with the world of care, compassion, of love and understanding at a time of most need. God bless those who work here and those who they support in this place of peace, reflection, and hope.'

Bereavement midwife Steph Thompson added: "We are so proud to have our Benson Suite here at Salisbury Hospital and available to those families who sadly have call to need it. It is my privilege to care for them but none of this would be possible without those who so kindly support our Stars Appeal Benson Suite Fund and I would like to express our sincere thanks to Sir Christopher and all of our generous supporters."

MUM JOINS STARS APPEAL'S WALK FOR WARDS AFTER BABY SPENT OVER TWO MONTHS IN SALISBURY'S NEONATAL UNIT

A mum whose taking part in Walk for Wards after her baby spent over two months in the Neonatal Unit at Salisbury Hospital has shared her experience about what it was like and how the Stars Appeal helped her and her family.

Hayley Howell's son Fletcher was born 11 weeks early in October last year. While Fletcher was in hospital Hayley and her partner David Hart were able to stay close by in the Stars Appeal's accommodation for parents.

She said: "We spent just over two months on the Neonatal Unit and stayed in the parents' accommodation. We kept saying we completely understand if we need to go but there was never any question about us having to go."

"It was comforting for me having David there," adds Hayley, who later moved into one of the Stars Appeal's mum and baby rooms after Fletcher's condition improved where she says it was "nice to be by your baby's side the whole time".

The mum and baby rooms provide a private space where they can stay together. The Stars Appeal recently funded the construction of two more of these rooms. There are now six mother and baby rooms in total which is in addition to the four larger en suite 'family' rooms. This means there is now room for every mum to stay.

Hayley is taking part in Walk for Wards with her family and will be part of a group of 15. She wanted to do something to "be able to give back" for all the support they received during Fletcher's time in hospital.

She says Fletcher is doing "perfectly" now but admits going into the Neonatal Unit was "scary at first" but staff made her feel comfortable and were "really comforting and helpful".

"I got to the point where I thought 'I don't think I can do this anymore' but they helped me keep going. The nurses and everybody on the unit were fantastic," admits Hayley, 34, who is from Amesbury.

"We nearly lost Fletcher a couple of weeks after he was born. He got a common cold and where he was so little it stopped him breathing. I was there on my own and remember the staff comforting me. They were so caring about us as parents as well as looking after our baby."

Hayley also praised the support for parents provided by the Stars Appeal, Salisbury District Hospital's Charity, to ease the stress of having a child in the Neonatal Unit, including free aromatherapy sessions which she says were a "God send" and the Stars Appeal Live musicians who play lullabies to the babies.

"These activities do the world of good for mums on the unit. It is something good to look forward to. The little extras are amazing," explains Hayley.

"Fletcher is my miracle baby. To lose him was unthinkable as it took us so long to conceive him. He is my world," she added.

"That Neonatal Unit is absolutely amazing."

NEWS FROM TRADING STANDARDS

Protected Food Names

What do Champagne, Parma Ham and Scotch Whiskey all have in common? They are protected food names. Dorset and the South West are also home to some fantastic traditional foods that carry the same legal protection as some of these well-known foods, such as watercress!

Dorset and the surrounding counties are home to the watercress industry, with several of the largest growers based here. Between them they supply the majority of all watercress sold in the UK supermarkets. Watercress using 'Nasturtium Officinale seeds' has been grown in flowing water to a traditional production method used for over 200 years. Recently this industry came under threat from cheaper imports of 'Landcress' being passed off as Watercress. Other cresses may look similar but are not produced in the same way, and do not have the same characteristic 'peppery' taste or contain the same levels of nutrients. To counter this the industry came together and successfully applied for the name 'watercress' to be protected and it was awarded the status of 'Traditional Speciality Guaranteed'.

Other foods produced in Dorset that are protected include Dorset Blue Cheese, West Country Farmhouse Cheddar Cheese, West Country Beef and Lamb, and the newly registered 'New Forest Pannage Ham' made from pigs that are fattened up on acorns whilst roaming the New Forest! Looking more widely across the region there is also the famous Cornish Pasty, Exmoor Blue Cheese, Wiltshire Cured Ham, Fal Oysters from Cornwall, Cornish Clotted Cream and Cornish Sardines.

There are three different types of protection. These are Protected Geographical Indication (PGI), Protected Designation of Origin (PDO) and Traditional Speciality Guaranteed' (TSG). You can recognise protected food as it must carry an appropriate logo.

Anyone wishing to produce a food that carries a protected food name must be audited againdt a published specification before they start to sell the food. Trading Standards typically carry out these audits to help both protect food names and the interests of local food producers.

LIGHT POLLUTION MEANS VAST MAJORITY OF US CAN'T ENJOY WONDER OF A PROPERLY DARK SKY, CPRE'S STAR COUNT SHOWS

- 75% of people are in areas with the worst three categories of light pollution.
- Campaigners, including Chris Packham, call for action to 'rewild the night sky' to improve the health of people and wildlife.
- Giving evidence to the House of Lords, CPRE identified key changes to national and local planning policy that, if implemented, could save councils hundreds of thousands of pounds in energy bills while improving the worst light polluted skies.

Light pollution affects the vast majority of the population, with threequarters of people in the UK finding their view of the night sky obscured, new data has shown. The results of Star Count 2023, released by CPRE, the countryside charity, find only five percent of people can enjoy the wonder of a truly dark starry sky. Almost 4,000 people took part in this year's Star Count, the country's biggest annual citizen science project of its kind, from 17-24 February. Participants were asked to report the number of stairs they could see with the naked eye in the Orion constellation. The results show that, for just over half the population, their view of the night sky remains obscured by severe light pollution. The proportion experiencing 'truly dark skies' and 'very severe light pollution' - the best and worst categories - both increased by two percent. In evidence presented this month to the House of Lords Science and Technology Committee, CPRE recommended that local authorities should have legal powers to control light pollution through planning regulations. Outdoor advertisements are already managed in a similar way. Further to that, key changes to national and local planning policy were identified that, if implemented, should lead to a step-change in reducing light pollution, including policies to protect dark skies and intrinsically dark landscapes.

Tom Fyans, interim CEO of CPRE, the countryside charity, said:

'The night sky is becoming increasingly obscured by artifical light. Sadly, this means most people in the UK can't see many stars at all, especially if they live near a big town or city. Yet, it's a form of pollution that has been allowed to grow for years without any significant effort being made to control the damage it's causing to people, nature and the environment.

'Local authorities could potentially save hundreds of thousands of pounds each year by not wasting energy on unnecessary lighting. It's an opportunity begging to be taken. All councils are looking for ways to save money and reduce carbon emissions - by cutting light pollution they'd improve people's sleep and mood at the same time.

'As anyone who has landed at an airport at night can attest, housing an roads cause the most light pollution. Local authorities and highways authorities are therefore responsible. They can take action by investing in well-designed lighting, that shines where and when needed. Dimming technology; switching off street lights, if and when they're unnecessary, in the dead of night; or better designed directional lighting would make a massive difference.'

There is increasing awareness of the effect that light pollution has on people's health and wellbeing. In a previous survey, CPRE found half of respondents said their sleep had been disrupted by light shining in through their bedroom window. More than one in ten people (14%) have slept in a different room to avoid light pollution and 3% have moved house to get away from light pollution. Artificial light is known to cause confusion to migrating birds, often with fatal outcomes. It interrupts natural rhythms, including the reproduction, feeding and sleeping patterns of pollinating insects, bats and nocturnal animals. In humans, studies show that exposure to light at night interrupts sleep and can disrupt the bodys protection of melatonin, a brain hormone best known for its daily role in resetting the body's biological clock.

Emma Marrington, landscape enhancement lead at CPRE, the countryside charity, said:

'It's great that so many people took part in Star Count this year. What is clear is that light pollution, by ensuring local planning and street lighting policies protect dark skies and intrinsically dark landscapes in their areas. We're also calling for minimum standards to be introduced nationally for the management of external lighting to cut light pollution. This would be hugely important step towards strengthened planning to ensure we get well-designed lighting that is only used when and where it is needed, protecting our existing dark skies for the benefit of current and future generations.'

CPRE is calling for stronger local and national planning policy to combat light pollution. The National Planning Policy Framework, where these policies are decided, is currently under review. Now is the time for the government to act.






