Spring Covid Booster

The campaign started on 17th April 2023 for adults aged 75 years and over and individuals aged 5 years and over who are immunosuppressed. However, they are only available until June 30th

The Blackmore Vale Partnership are not providing these vaccines this Spring, so please do not ring the Practice.

The NHS will write to people to remind those eligible that they can get the vaccine, but bookings can be made at any time via the National Booking Service or calling 119 - most sites are appointment only. There are some local clinics being held in the following venues:

- Blandford Community Hospital (Outpatient Clinic), Blandford Forum. DT11 7DD. Clinics will be held on Saturdays between 09:00 - 17:30.

- Westminster Memorial Hospital, Abbey Walk, Shaftesbury, SP7 8BD. Clinics will be held in the Outpatients Department on Thursdays between 09:30 - 16:30 and Fridays between 13:30 - 16:30.

The residents in care home for older adults has already begun. Patients who are registered as housebound will be contacted by Dorset Health Care when their COVID booster is due, to arrange a visit from a vaccination team. For any queries from patients, please contact Dorset Health Care direct in the first instance.

You can find out all you need to know about COVID-19 vaccinations, including who is eligible for a seasonal booster by searching 'Dorset vaccination service' online or calling 119.

We know that our phone lines can be busy, and we are starting to provide more online solutions for more effective and efficient communication. This also has a positive impact for those who cannot access an online option by freeing up the phone lines for those that need to use them. It's never too late to tell us if you can't attend an appointment."

In Dorset last month, there were around 12,000 appointments in general practice where the patient did not attend an appointment. This is 3000 hours of valuable time with a health care professional that was not used.

"We recognise that people have commitments and situations can change" comments Dr Ben Sharland, GP partner in Bournemouth and Deputy Chair of Dorset General Practice. We want to understand the reason why people might be missing their appointments and how we can help with this. We are concerned that people might be missing appointments and leaving themselves with medical problems that are not being diagnosed or treated in a timely way. We know that the sooner people seek help the better the outcomes."



STURMINSTER NEWTON LITERARY FESTIVAL



Sturminster Newton Literary Festival is back for a fourth year and will run from 5-10 June 2023.

This year the programme in the North Dorset town has expanded to include non fiction events and now encompasses the wider Wessex footprint.

This year, ticket holders can hear about a range of topics from a sequel to Tess of the D'Urbervilles by Michael Langridge, to the experiences of a helicopter test pilot from Chris Taylor, and nuggets of Dorset history from Jon Woolcott. Highlights of the festival include journalist Felice Hardy talking about her grandmother, an Austrian tennis champion who escaped the Nazis and went on to play at Wimbledon. West Dorset based author Brian Jackman will discuss how the natural surroundings of his parish inspired him to write Wild About Dorset. Local poet David Caddy will be reading Rupert Brooke's poetry in a railway carriage at Shillingstone Station. The exquisite nature photography of Jane V Adams is the focus of another festival talk. Fiction writers include Salisbury based Elisabeth Conway and Matthew Harffy from Wiltshire.

A dramatic monologue by local playwright Sue Ashby, From Sturminster Newton to The White House: the Fuller sisters in America will premiere during the festival. Local singers Rachael Alexander, Rachael Revell, and Lina Felsa will perform some of the songs sung by the Fuller sisters on their tours at the turn of the 20th century.

The festival is collaborating with other businesses and organisations this year. The 1855 building will be transformed into a pre-loved fashion show catwalk for a talk by Libby Page on her new book, The Vintage Shop of Second Chances. And pomologist Liz Copas and cider maker Nick Poole will talk about their research into the lost orchards of Dorset. The walks programme includes a look at Robert Young's Sturminster Newton and the Marnhull setting for Tess of the D'Urbervilles. Talks on the stainedglass windows in St Mary's Church will be given during festival week.

The church has glass designed by Harry Clarke and Mary Lowndes, two of the most famous stained glass artists of the 20th century. Festival committee chairman, Pauline Batstone said: "I am delighted that we have such a full and wide ranging programme for our fourth year. Thank you to all those who have worked hard to bring this together and to all those who plan to attend our events."

WHAT DOES IT MEAN TO BE HUMAN?

On June 8th Churches Together are delighted to offer the first of some inspiring talks and discussions on theology, philosophy, and ethics, which are open to all. The first topic is entitled "What does it mean to be Human?". This talk will essentially take the form of a philosophical approach to the big question of who we are. Obviously, the subject is vast and cannot be covered in a short space of time, so the talk will focus on the debate about the existence of soul.

The presentation will be given by Jacintha Bowe, who holds a degree in theology and philosophy, and who has taught and lectured theology and philosophy for many decades.


If you enjoy taking photos, making things (out of literally anything) or growing things, there will be a class that you could enter. We've even got a class for the ones that are work in progress.



A SPARE PAIR OF EYES

Are you looking for an interesting add-venture. 'Add-venture in Learning' is a charity who organise 'Study Breaks' for visually impaired adults who seek to extend their knowledge whilst enjoying a break away. On each trip the visually impaired person is helped by a sighted guide who can show them around and describe what they are seeing.

Our members come from all over the country so we try and arrange Study Breaks in different areas each year with diverse subjects. The charity is run by volunteers and is self funded so everyone has to pay, although guides get a reduced rate. Where necessary we employ professional tutors or speakers. Last year we learnt about the history of the Horn and listened to a variety of music whilst staying in Weston Super Mare, then it was out and about in Norwich for local history and then all things 'eco' at the Centre for Alternative Energy in Wales.

This year it is Agatha Christie in Torquay and Leicester for local history, and another study break is being planned for later in the year.

MARNHULL WOMENS' INSTITUTE - APRIL

It is always intriguing to get a glimpse into a lifestyle which is completely different from one's own and we had that opportunity when Kay Townsend came to speak to us.

Kay was born into a showman's family. Her parents owned fairground rides and earned their money taking these around to various carnivals and fairs in the west country. She was at pains to point out that although various social groups are accustomed to living in caravans and leading a somewhat peripatetic existence, there was a difference between gipsies, circus people and showmen. To the untutored eye they may seem similar but their origins, lifestyle and traditions are quite distinct.

The fairground tradition evolved gradually from the jugglers and acrobats who began to entertain folk at the cloth and livestock fairs which were held in town squares during the 13th and 14th centuries. The first "rides" catering for children consisted of a central pole with radiating ropes which held a circular wooden platform. For a halfpenny each children could perch on the seat and the whole suspended ring would be whirled round manually by the showman. The only motive power available at the time was the horse or the muscles of the man.

With the advent of the steam engine in 19th century things got a lot more exciting. A traction engine could tow a much larger load so living caravans became progressively more luxurious. On the fairground the rides also increased in size and complexity. By degrees the Waltzer, the Dodgems, the Gallopers and so on that we now expect to find at the fair began to appear.

A showman has to make all his money at the fairs and carnivals. As well as his own living quarters he needs one or two lorries to cart the rides from place to place and a team to erect and dismantle them as well as run them for the public. He must adhere to the very strict health and safety regulations which involve regular inspection from mechanical engineers. electrical experts and also an ultrasonic inspector who assesses the strength and durability of every metal joint in the structure. The lack of any one of these essential certificates would mean he would not be allowed to run his ride.

Kay herself used to run and manage one of the smaller stalls to be found at every fair, such as the hoopla or the coconut shy. She plainly revelled in the memories of an unsual and rather exciting childhood.

Revd Lin concluded the talks with Scripture references and readings. The lunches were provided by parishioners from all three churches, and whilst they were very simple, they were delicious. Our thanks must extend to those willing volunteers.

MARNHULL MUSIC SOCIETY

Merle Evans has a wide range of musical knowledge and so we have learned to expect plenty of novel experiences when she present a programme, and we were not disappointed in March.

We started with satisfying Chopin concerto and then Merle introduced a somewhat otherwordly piece by Paul Brandenburg called "Mirador Lanzarote" from his Mystic Islands suite. It involves flutes and pipes and a keyboard in an eerie melody with a faintly Hawaiian feel. It is totally strange to the ear but immensely attractive.

Merle is a keen opera fan and so we knew we would have a selection of great voices and the first was Beniamino Gigli singing a Verdi aria., and soon after came Jessye Norman with Strauss' "September" from his Four Last Songs.

Between these vocal treats we heard Claire Jones playing Gliere's Harp Concerto in E flat. Then the delicate sound of the harp was contrasted with a heavy and rather gloomy organ piece by Vierne which imitated the sound of a carillon of bells.

Mozart's symphony No.4 and Tchaikovsky's balletic and buoyant "I Musici do Montreal" finished the first half of the programme.

The louche and syrupy brass of Shostakovich's "Foxtrot" from his Jazz Suite No.1 began the second half of the concert. I love this piece but it's no wonder that the soviet authorities declared it decadent. It certainly conjures up visions of smoke-filled nightclubs.

Another new experience was Hawes' "The Waters of Love" from The Wedding at Cana. It is a superbly melodic piece for a soprano and a tenor, and well worth further investigation for lovers of the voice. After Tasmin Little playing Lalo's sprightly "Symphonie Espagnol", Massanet's "Meditation" showcasing the flute and Angela Gheorgiu singing a Charpentier song, we finished in rousing style with Dvorak's Symphony No. "From the New World."

In June we have a presentation by Colin Shiner.

NEW FROM TRADING STANDARDS

Resolving your consumer complaint

When you have a complaint with a business seller over a product or service, then the usual way to resolve things is through a stepped approach. First check if the seller has an official complaints procedure that you could follow

If you need to make things more formal, then it's best to email or write to the seller, keeping a copy in case you have to show later you have made a compliant. You can use a template letter mentioned below.

If you paid with a credit card or debit card, then you should also send a copy of your complaint letter to the card provider. This will help if you decide to make a claim against the card provider later.

Check if the seller belongs to a trade association. The seller might have to follow certain rules, and if they've broken the rules then you could get help from the association to take your complaint further.

Update your card provider with another letter that lets them know that you still haven't been able to resolve the dispute with the seller. You may have a claim against the card provider.

Some sellers belong to an alternative dispute resolution scheme, which is a way to solve problems through mediation. If you are thinking of taking a seller to court, you should try this route first, a judge will usually expect it. If the seller is not a member of this type of scheme, then ask them if they'd be willing to find and use one.

Finally, you can make a 'small claim' to court if your problem hasn't been resolved. Going to court can be stressful and time consuming and so it's probably only worth doing this if the item or service was particularly expensive.



LEUKAEMIA PATIENT SHARES STORY OF HOW THE STARS APPEAL HAS SUPPORTED HIM THROUGHOUT HIS CANCER TREATMENT



At the age of 26, Charles McGrath from Salisbury was given the shocking news that he had acute leukaemia. After his diagnosis on September 16,

2022, he had intensive

chemotherapy and says projects for cancer patients funded by the Stars Appeal, Salisbury District Hospital's Charity, made all the difference to him during his time in hospital.

The charity's cancer support projects include free drinks for chemotherapy and oncology outpatients, aromatherapy, free headwear for patients who lose their hair, dedicated swimming sessions in the Hospital pool as well as wellbeing programmes. It also funds enhancements to the Pembroke Unit's furnishings and décor along with additional medical equipment.

Charles said: "Having the volunteers come around with free drinks and a friendly face made my time in hospital much more comfortable. For blood cancer patients like myself, you often have to spend long periods of time in hospital. I wouldn't have known what to do if I hadn't had the Stars

Appeal's free Wi-Fi! It was not just about having access to the internet; it was also being able to call my

family and friends and stay in touch with the outside world." Charles, who is a councillor on Salisbury City Council and Wiltshire Council, is currently waiting for results to find out the next steps for his treatment.

Recalling the day he received his diagnosis for acute myeloid leukaemia, he says he felt "numb"

and added: "It was a pretty shocking time overall. I'm appreciative that I was able to start treatment as quickly as I did, which was all down to the haematology team and the staff on the Pembroke Ward at Salisbury District Hospital."

Experiencing the support of Stars Appeal-funded projects first-hand inspired Charles to do a sponsored head shave. It was also a way to thank Pembroke Unit staff for their "constant support" throughout his treatment. Earlier this month, he returned to the unit to present a donation of £1,780 to staff for the charity's Pembroke Unit Fund.

His fundraising efforts for the Stars Appeal will continue when he takes part in Walk for Wards on Sunday, July 9, which will be the sixth time he's done it. He said: "The Stars Appeal fund so many things from new medical equipment to free drinks and food given to patients receiving their cancer treatment. It's a great opportunity to give back to such a vital cause."

Stars Appeal Ambassador, Dr Tracey Parker, Consultant Haematologist at Salisbury District Hospital, added: "The Stars Appeal helps to fund fantastic programmes like physical rehabilitation and complimentary therapies for our blood cancer patients. This helps them to feel good and have better outcomes from their chemotherapy and bone marrow transplants. Thanks to everyone like Charles who supports the Stars Appeal and makes this possible!"
