

Held in September, this event was enjoyed by more than 600 visitors and Our LTA accredited coach Graham Howell is always available for one to 60 exhibitors. As a result, it will improve the health and wellbeing of a one or group coaching. You can contact him on 01747 837839 or 07931 great many of those who attended. For example, we offered free mini 584778 health checks, height, weight, blood pressure and pulse. 93 were carried out, in fact for some it was the reason they came, as the first twenty or so HALF PRICE MEMBERSHIP through the door headed straight for the health check!

Amongst the 93 checks, 43 had raised blood pressure and 12, an irregular pulse.

15 were advised to make a GP appointment and 14 had an appointment booked there and then for blood tests and/or an ECG.

For more information on the club, how to join and lots more, head to These people had no idea that they had these issues and by identifying www.marnhulltennisclub.net them and signposting them to treatment, support and advice it will help them and in the longer term, help the pressures on the health service. A small, but evidence based example of the benefit of these kind of events. A wide range of groups and organisations took part, all of whom felt their presence was worthwhile, with many saying that it was also a great way to MARNHULL GREEN network and quite a few didn't realise that some of the other organisations or groups even existed, so there will be lots of join up which will benefit people in the future.

A brochure containing the details of every exhibitor was given to every visitor. This is now on the Blackmore Vale Partnership website under Men's Health and we handed out spare copies at the recent Flu/ Covid vaccination clinics. From an exit survey of 135 visitors, 97% said it exceeded or met their expectations and the same percentage felt better informed about health and wellbeing opportunities in the area. Of those, 84% were male and 15% female and the age range was 75% over 50. We had hoped to attract more younger people given that the location was a leisure and fitness centre.

And finally a couple of comments - firstly from an exhibitor "The buzz, the venue, the contributors, and the ability to have some really good personal conversations with attendees that I hope made (or will make) a real difference. Your team set a great spirit among those attending, both for the groups and organisations, and the public"

And from a visitor - "Friendly, knowledgeable people, eager to engage and share knowledge and information"



Taking the Environment Around Marnhull Seriously

In last month's Messenger we noted the interesting discussion on the village Facebook page about electric vehicles - cars, principally - that followed Marnhull Green Teams' announcement of our latest Electric Vehicle Show, in the Crown carpark on 23 September. We said then that we would pick up that discussion in this month's article. The Show was well-attended, with several cars (hybrid and fully-electric) and e-bikes to have a look at, and their owners to chat to about their experience. Our thanks again to the team at the Crown for accommodating us. But it is clear from the Facebook discussion that not everyone is convinced about electric cars - and it does have to be said that the apparent indecision and lack of guidance on climate issues at national level has not been helpful. Even the car industry is saying so.

It is worth saying again that Marnhull Green Teams' position on this has been our usual one; that of sharing experience - which we remain happy to do if anyone has questions. Contact us at marnhullgreen@outlook. com, via our website - marnhullgreen.com - or on (01258) 268714. We certainly recommend seeking advice from reputable experts; the AA, for example, at theaa.com/driving-advice/electric-vehicles or the RAC, at rac. co.uk/drive/electric-cars/choosing.

As to the vehicles themselves, none of us pretend that they are a perfect response to the climate crisis. Yes, the world must reduce the amount of CO2 and pollutants in the atmosphere; and yes, an electric car on the road does do this. If you can power up your car using your own resources - PV panels and domestic batteries - that's great; but it does involve investing capital that most of us can't spare. A good alternative is to sign up with an energy company which uses commercial solar and wind power. But do either of these options mean that an electric car is pollution-free? No, of course not.

To begin with there are all the issues around manufacturing the vehicle and its replacement parts and transporting them to you, as well as establishing the infrastructure needed to keep the car running and to



dispose of it at the end of its life. There is a strong argument for all of us keeping our cars for longer - if switching to public transport is not a viable option - because the environmental costs of replacing our vehicles partially offset the gains from 'going electric'.

There are other issues too. 'Range anxiety' is one - although this can be from the two schools in the village as it will be harder to organise but if overcome with what is basically a change of mindset, and will lessen as they want to lay their wreaths on the memorial befoehand they are quite fast-charging capabilities improve. #### **Stonehenge - We Need to Talk**

#### Sunday 26th November 10.00am -5.00pm



Stonehenge is a world-famous monument, the greatest achievement of our prehistoric ancestors. It has been the subject of investigation and speculation for centuries and, while science has provided some answers, there is much that remains enigmatic.

This day will feature presentations by three leading experts in their individual fields:

Julian Richards is an archaeologist who has studied Stonehenge and its landscapes for over 40 years. The author of a number of publications on the subject of Stonehenge, Julian also examines Stonehenge as a cultural icon.

Simon Banton is an archaeoastronomer - someone who studies humanity's eternal fascination with the sky and its expression through ancient monuments. He's been an astronomer for over 50 years and a Stonehenge geek for the last 30.

Luke Winter is one of the country's leading experimental archaeologists. Responsible for the design and build of the Neolithic houses at the Stonehenge Visitor centre, Luke brings a unique insight to the question of how Stonehenge might have been built and the lives of its builders.

After each presentation there will be an opportunity for questions and discussion and the remainder of the day will allow the opportunity to explore wider issues. This is the chance to ask all those questions about Stonehenge that you have always wanted to ask...

The course starts with registration at 10.00am. Tea/coffee will be provided throughout the day. Lunch is not provided and there are no shops or food outlets nearby so please bring a packed lunch. Lunchtime will give an opportunity to explore Springhead's beautiful gardens. Please note the heating is kept low so wrap up well.

The course is strictly limited to 40 participants and early booking is advised. The cost per person is £40 and all proceeds will go towards supporting Springheads education aims. www.springheadtrust.org.uk

Those of you who regularly listen to Classicfm will know that there has been quite a lot of air-time recently directed at music especially written for the cinema. For our September concert Jo and Alan Loukes took a different approach and crafted a programme of classical music that has been appropriated by the film industry.

For example, who can forget the puissant sunrise in "2001- a Space Odyssey" heralded by Richard Strauss's "Also Sparch Zarathustra" or the Boccherini quintet which gave background cover to Alec Guinness and his inept hit-men in "The Lady Killers"? Another indelible image is of a panicking Micky Mouse with his unstoppable magic brooms in The Sorcerer's apprentice, music by Dukas.

Samual Barber's Adagio for Strings was the haunting soundtrack in the 1986 film "Platoon" and the Mozart piano concerto #21 got its popular name because it featured in a Swedish film called "Elvira Madigan". Inevitably Wagner's music is used guite often in films and a good number chose pieces from Tristan und Isolde, such as the 1996 film "Shakespeare

- Romeo and Juliet". Mozart's "Lacrimosa" from his D minor Requiem captured the poignant atmosphere in a scene from "Eyes Wide Shut" starring Tom Cruise and Nicole Kidman.



Jo and Alan provided our audience with a wealth of fascinating information about the films and the music borrowed to set off the mood and sensations sought by the directors. #### MARNHULL HORSE RIDERS



Well summer has faded and we are now in to the dark side of life again for the next 6 months. Also with the days being shorter it's hard to find time to get your ponies and horses out for exercise in between work and household chores. The roads seem busier than ever and this isn't going to change. Remember dark ponies, dark clothing means you can't be seen so always wear as much hi viz as you can to keep you and your pony as safe as possible.

We are ever hopeful that the Toogoods Bridleway will have new equestrian gates soon – I know I've been saying that for months now but I've been reassured by Dorset Countryside Rangers

that they have been out of stock for 2/3 months and they are expecting them within the next few weeks. They will be delivered and the work will be down to the farmer and when he can find time to do it - I have no control of this - but fingers crossed.



I walked the route with the Ranger a few months ago and access along the bridleway is far from easy as it is. The big old gates have been re hung. Existing gate handles are old inefficient



(we hope to have these upgraded). Quite a few of the gates now have chains as well, I understand is to prevent livestock opening them when they rub against them. We are hopeful that we will have two new equestrian gates fitted beside the big field gates. One on the gate as you rise up the hill (the gate drops back towards you at the moment

Also one new equestrian gate which goes out on to the road at the top. I should mention that there is also another new gate between these two which the farmer has installed. The gate latches are going to be changed. Though inconvenient to riders this extra gate does create a drove you can safely canter along without fear of livestock!

Through no fault of my own, this has taken 18 months so far but at the end of it we will have a super long ride from Toogoods Farm up to Whiteway Lane behind Hinton St Mary and beyond .... Keep safe everybody and keep trotting on!






Autumn in Marnhull



#### **ST GREGORY'S C OF E PRIMARY SCHOOL**



News from St Gregory's Primary School Marnhull Messenger Autumn 2023

The children have had a very busy start to the term, settling into their new classes and having fun with their friends. They are also getting used to working with a new, enquiry-led curriculum, known as Curious-city, where instead of 'doing history', they are learning how to be historians; rather than drawing or collage-making, they are being artists; and when studying physics, biology or chemistry they are being scientists. These 'states of being' are having a real impact on the children's learning already, and they are becoming much more involved in their learning, with parents telling us their children are able to talk with real enthusiasm about their day at school.

Other exciting opportunities this half term have included a number of Bikeability courses for the older children to learn how to ride safely on the roads, and visitors to the school to share their expertise on subjects as diverse as Coding for Computers and The Circulation System, while our Harvest Assembly in St Gregory's Church yielded a wonderful crop of breakfast cereals, baked beans and biscuits for donation to the local food bank. Shortly after half term, children in Years 5 and 6 are heading off to North Devon for a residential trip involving high ropes and orienteering, abseiling and camp fires, mud challenges and archery, excellent food and lots of singing! It also gives them the chance to get to know each other better in a different environment and, for many of them, experience their first trip away from home. The children will share their experiences in the next edition of the Marnhull Messenger.

#### Hedgehogs Class

This half term we have welcomed the new reception children who have settled well and the new Year 1 children have adapted to being great role models for them. We had an exciting start to the term with our first 'Curious-city' enquiry of 'Who Am I?' during which we learnt about who is in our family and painted selfportraits. During the first couple of weeks we took advantage of the sunshine and became familiar with our swimming pool, especially for the youngest members of the class this was an introduction to becoming water

confident and we will continue our lessons in the Summer Term.



The second half of this half term our enquiry has been 'How can we lead a healthy life?'. During our learning we have investigated what we need to survive, which foods are healthy and how they are grown. We have been reading 'Oliver's Vegetables' as our class book with the Reception children enjoying acting out the story and role playing in our fruit and veg shop, and the Year 1 children have innovated the story using their own choice of vegetables. We had a fantastic trip to the village allotments where the Marnhull Green Team showed us around. We

were able to explore what vegetables they grow and help with harvesting some of the remaining ones of this season. Our final challenge is to design and make a healthy wrap using all the knowledge we have learnt about being healthy.

#### **Badgers Class**

This term, children in Years 3 and 4's Curious-city topic is 'What is sound?". We have been Scientists, Musicians, and Engineers while learning all about what is sound, how sounds are made and



how they change. We also learnt how sounds are detected and what are good sound insulators. We have learnt the vocabulary such as pitch, vibration, volume, insulation etc.

We have been Engineers and made straw pan-pipes. We learnt about different pitches and it was great fun to see how different straw lengths make different pitches. We also used a guitar to make high and low sounds.

**Foxes Class** 

Foxes Class have been busy this half-term following the enquiry question: how are lives saved? We have learnt the functions of the heart and the circulatory system and will be producing a TED talk about the importance of easy access to defibrillators as our challenge. We have also been looking into the history of the school which celebrates its 150th anniversary this year - the old log-books are fascinating!





We have all immensely

enjoyed reading Holes by Louis Sachar as our first class-reader this term and have produced some outstanding nonchronological reports about the deadly yellow spotted lizard from the book.

The children have been lucky enough to receive samba lessons on Tuesdays from Dorset Music - they sound wonderful playing all together in the hall and always come back from their lesson with big smiles!

This week we took part in Dorset Coding Day where we used Scratch to start to build our own video game. We were fortunate to have a volunteer from Dorset Council Care Records join us to share her coding knowledge and empower girls to consider careers in STEM.

#### ST MARY'S CATHOLIC PRIMARY SCHOOL



As we draw to the end of the first half of the Autumn term, we have been enjoying the lovely warm days as well as the beautiful autumnal colours the season brings us. Parents had the chance to meet with teachers and hear how well their children had settled back into school. Children who joined us in September have quickly become part of our St Mary's family. It was great to be able to celebrate

our Harvest Festival with parents and grandparents, and I'm sure several of them went home with either 'Harvest Samba' or 'Big Red Combine Harvester' going around in their heads! It certainly did in mine!!



We were able to support The Vale Pantry in Sturminster Newton with the donations. The GIFT team took them down before we broke up for half

term. We are now looking forward to a well-earned rest at the half-term break, ready to face the fun and mayhem that the second half of the term brings with the run up to Christmas.

#### St Mary's Explorers Pre-school

Explorers have been busy getting learning about the world around them, using all their senses.

They have loved 'Welly Walks', joining the peers in Reception and exploring the local area. A particular favourite has been the mud kitchen where the children have been snipping herbs and mixing potions. They also continue to enjoy our role play area, taking on different roles in their play and developing relationships with their peers.

Fiddly finger activities continue to be a focus for our preschool children, developing the muscles needed for writina.

St Mary's Explorers is open from 8:45am -3:15pm every weekday during term time and spaces are available for children aged 3 years +, with wrap around care from 8am – 6pm. #### St Anthony's

#### **Phone Changes Information**

The UK's telephone network is being upgraded, which means that Yes – in most cases you'll be able to keep your current phone number. landline services are changing. You can still have a landline in your home, but the technology that powers it will be different. For most, switching over will be straightforward, but some people may need new equipment or support to make the changes.

#### What's changing and when?

Traditionally, landlines have been delivered through an analogue network, but this is being replaced by digital technology. The new system is called 'Voice over Internet Protocol' (VoIP), but you may also hear the terms 'Digital Voice' (from the landline provider BT) or digital phone.

What is VoIP? Will I need an internet connection to make phone calls?

VoIP is a type of phone system that uses an internet connection to make and receive calls. Given this, you'll need an at-home internet connection to use the new landline digital system. Once you've moved to the new digital system, your landline will mainly work as it always has, although there'll be some differences - for example, it won't work if there's a power cut unless you have a battery backup.

The changeover has started, and some people have already been moved to the digital system. For almost all networks, the changeover will have happened by December 2025. The BT network, which is used by some other telecoms providers, will close by December 2025. Most other companies with their own networks, like Virgin Media, plan to follow the same timescale

BT has started to roll out its programme on a region-by-region basis. However, in general, they aren't currently switching certain groups, including:

- · people aged 70 and over
- people with additional needs
- people who only have a landline (and not broadband)
- people with telecare alarms
- people with no mobile signal at home.

Other companies have also started rolling out digital systems. In some areas, changes to the network will mean that everyone needs to move to the digital system. You may also be moved to the new system if you decide to move to a new phone and broadband package. If you haven't been moved over yet, don't worry – your phone company will get in touch with you when they want you to make the change.

#### What is Broadband?

Broadband just means a high-speed internet connection.

Why are these changes happening?

The current landline network needs to be replaced because it's old and is becoming difficult to maintain. The new system uses the internet to make phone calls - this offers better quality calls as well as some additional features. Phone and broadband companies are leading this change. The Government is supporting it. The aim of Ofcom (the communications regulator) is to make sure customers don't face unnecessary disruption or harm because of the changes.

What happens when I change to the digital system?

Your telephone provider will contact you in advance to let you know when your system's changing and what you need to do. In some cases, an engineer will need to visit to make changes.

For lots of people, the change will be straightforward. If you already have a broadband connection, you may just need to plug your phone into your broadband router or you'll be sent an adapter that connects to your phone and plugs into your router

If you have more than one phone socket with separate handsets, you may need additional adapters. When you're contacted by your provider let them know if you have any questions or concerns about moving to the digital service, or if you need any additional help.

#### Can I keep my phone number?

#### Will I need a new phone?

If your phone handset is very old, you might need to change it. Your phone provider will be able to advise you on this.

#### Will anything else be affected, like my telecare?

The switch to digital landlines may affect telecare devices and other equipment such as personal alarms and security alarms if they're connected to your phone line. Although your telephone service provider will contact you before the switch takes place, you may want to let them know about any telecare devices that you have in advance. It's also a good idea to contact the supplier of your telecare device to check that this will work with the new system or whether any equipment will need to be upgraded. If you're buying a new device that's linked to the phone system, you should also check with the seller or manufacturer that this will be compatible.

#### What if I don't have, or don't want, the internet at home?

If you already have a broadband connection, for example to connect to the internet, then the new digital landline system will use this.

If you don't have a broadband connection, your provider will supply one specifically to support the new digital system, but you shouldn't pay extra for this if you don't move over to a broadband service.

#### Will my new phone contract be more expensive?

BT has committed to not raise prices above inflation for 'voice only' customers until 2026. 'Voice only' customers are those who don't have home broadband. Virgin Media has also said that people won't pay more than what they already pay for their current service. This means that you shouldn't face extra costs if you need a new simple internet connection to make calls.

#### What happens if there's a power cut?

Unlike some traditional corded analogue phones, a digital phone will only work in a power cut if it has a battery back-up, because it'll run using your home electricity. In these instances, phone companies are advising people to use mobile phones as a backup.

If you're dependent on your landline phone – for example, if you don't have a mobile phone or you live somewhere where there's no or poor mobile signal, then your telephone provider must offer you a 'resilience solution' to make sure you can make emergency calls during a power cut. This could be a mobile phone (if you have mobile signal) or a batterybackup unit for your landline phone. This resilience solution should be provided free of charge to people who are dependent on their landline. If you're not eligible for a free resilience solution, you may be able to purchase one from your provider or another retailer - talk to your provider about the options available to you.



#### **MARNHULL WOMENS' INSTITUTE**

It hardly seems likely that a degree in Politics followed by a Master's degree in War and Strategy plus a brief foray into the catering trade would be the basis for staking one's fortunes on a start-up gin distillery. But that's what Wilfred Shron did. Installing himself in an industrial container, he began by importing distilling vats and apparatus from Portugal and quantities of raw potato alcohol from Poland. Having applied for the multiple licences and permits necessary he started the delicate task of blending botanicals in a variety of combinations as he searched for his signature taste.

There turned out to be a lot more to this business than mere chemistry. Wilfred explained about deciding on his "brand" and how it was to be presented. The Shroton Fair was a big rural event for hundreds of years. Thomas Hardy mentioned it in his writing as a place where labourers were hired for the coming months on the farms. Wilfred chose this name for his gin, and the extraordinary spectacle of a real live Bengal tiger being on show one year during the eighteenth century gave him his logo.

His choice of a black bottle was problematic as there were few companies able to produce it as he required, but eventually he realised his vision and now the recognisable squat black bottle with its red tiger's head can be seen at shows and fairs around the county and in several of our local shops

Shroton Fair gin contains sixteen botanicals but rather than list them all may I suggest that you buy a bottle and sample it for yourself? Our November speaker is Grace Lovelass and her talk is entitled "The Life of an Opera Singer."

#### **Digital Switchover scams**

The UK's telephone network is changing. Between now and 2025 most telephone providers will be moving their customers from old analogue landlines to new upgraded landline services using digital technology. Services that rely on the old landline system such as home phones and healthcare devices will be switched over.

The new network will provide a future proof, more reliable and dependable broadband service that will support the UK for decades to come.

The Local Government Association (LGA) says the change will be straightforward for most people. However, they have warned that criminals are using misinformation about the switchover to confuse people vulnerable to scams.

The LGA says people who use healthcare telephony devices are particularly at risk of being targeted by scammers, who trick victims into disclosing their personal and financial information over the phone. Around 2 million people use these devices across the country.

The switchover is free of charge and councils and their homecare alarm providers or contractors will never ask for personal or financial information over the phone.

The LGA says it has seen reports of fraudsters calling people claiming their bank details are needed as part of the switchover or their service will be disconnected. It has also received reports of residents being contacted over the phone by callers claiming to work for the NHS, asking for their personal information.

The LGA expects scam attempts to increase as the switchover date nears. In addition to phone calls, criminals may create phishing emails and fake websites to try to obtain peoples' personal data.

Telecoms providers such as Virgin Media, O2 or BT should contact customers before the switchover to check in to make sure their service isn't affected.

Anyone with telecare services should check how the switchover will affect them, and what they need to do to be ready, so their care isn't disrupted.
