Flu & Covid Vaccinations 2023/24 Are you over 65 or at risk?

The Blackmore Vale Partnership will be providing Flu and Covid vaccines this Autumn. The Government have asked these vaccinations are given together and as early as possible and the programme has been brought forward.

The vaccination programme will start as soon as the flu vaccines are received and the Government has asked that adult care home residents are vaccinated first.

Other people are in the process of being invited to the clinics at The Exchange in Sturminster Newton. The invitation will be by an Appointment link texted out to your mobile or email in the next week or so.

If you don't use the internet or mobile phone, you will still be contacted/ These invitations will be sent out based on the priority criteria set by the Government.

Clinic dates have been set up as:

- Saturday 30th September
- Saturday 07th October
- Saturday 14th October
- Saturday 21st October

Please **DO NOT** ring the surgery about your appointment, they will contact you once the clinics are ready to be booked

The NHS has confirmed that the people who are eligible for an NHS Flu & Covid Vaccine are listed below:

- those aged 65 years and over
- those aged 6 months to under 65 years in clinical risk groups
- pregnant women
- all children aged 2 or 3 years on 31 August 2023
- primary school aged children (from Reception to Year 6)
- those in long-stay residential care homes

• carers in receipt of carer's allowance, or those who are the main carer of an elderly or disabled person

close contacts of immunocompromised individuals

• frontline workers in a social care setting without an employer led occupational health scheme including those working for a registered residential care or nursing home, registered domiciliary care providers, voluntary managed hospice providers and those that are employed by those who receive direct payments (personal budgets) or Personal Health budgets, such as Personal Assistants

The Blackmore Vale Partnership will be working with Dorset Healthcare to provide vaccinations to those that are housebound.

Dorset Healthcare will continue to vaccinate children under 18 years old. Please be patient with staff at this very busy time while they try and book patients according to need.

Know Your Numbers – Check your Blood Pressure

Your blood pressure is important, no matter your age. Taking the time to know your numbers will help to stop stroke and heart disease and could save your life.

High blood pressure is a major cause of these diseases, but often has no symptoms until it's too late. Knowing your numbers means you can start making healthy lifestyle changes or taking medicines if you need them to

bring your blood pressure down to a healthy level.

A national campaign is running at the moment, so encourage your friends and family to check theirs too.

There is a NHS Blood Pressure tool online, where you can enter your numbers and it will help you to understand what your reading means and get information on what to do next.

Some pharmacies offer free blood pressure checks, so you could arrange one next time you're in the supermarket or on the high street. If you're offered a free NHS Health Check by your GP practice or LiveWell Dorset, you'll get your blood pressure checked as part of your appointment.

If you're concerned about your blood pressure, the Practice can offer you advice, via Klinik, or a 'phone call.



Taking the Environment Around Marnhull Seriously

That the world is facing climate and biodiversity crises is clear. The scientific evidence is overwhelming, and we ignore it - quite literally - at our peril.

What we can do about these crises is less clear, however, especially as individuals. We want to do something - but what? What can we afford to do, and what priority should we give it? Are there simple solutions to all these problems?

The answer to that last question is usually 'no', unfortunately. There are lots of things we can do - and some of them are simple: growing our fruit and veg in a garden or on an allotment is one example. But other ideas come with cons as well as pros.

The announcement of Marnhull Green Teams' Electric Vehicle Show, at the Crown on 23 September, led to an interesting debate of such pros and cons on Facebook. As the Messenger's deadlines mean that this article must be submitted before the Show, and as we hope the discussion will continue at the event, we will seek to summarise it in next month's magazine.

In the meantime, it's worth repeating that Marnhull Green Teams are just a group of local people with a shared concern about the state of the environment and an interest in a range of ways of trying to improve it. Examples include our weekly recycling centre at the Village Hall (Saturday mornings, 10-12), our Giveaway & Takeaway Days (encouraging re-use of all sorts of items), our solar energy and heat pump information-sharing events, the community allotment & orchard, and relevant tours and talks. We are not alone in such things, of course! The Litterpickers do a great job around the village, for instance; and don't forget the excellent Repair Shop at the Hub - also at the Village Hall, 10-12, Saturdays. But we complement these initiatives as we can.

As another example, we mentioned the Green Teams' organic gardening group in last month's Messenger. Its members meet informally from time to time in each other's gardens (indoors if wet!) and they are currently arranging a seed share. Please email marnhullgreen@outlook.com or phone (01258) 268714 if you would like to join the group, take part in the seed share, or both.

Now, as summer begins to draw to a close, we are looking ahead at what we will continue, repeat, or begin! 



Now is a great time to join the Friends of Salisbury Cathedral! The Friends' charity was founded in 1930 and since then has given thousands of pounds in grants to help preserve the cathedral and safeguard it for future generations.

In the 2022/23 financial year, the Friends gave grants to replace the cathedral's external lighting with LED units, and to purchase a new chamber organ, two TV screens for use at the weekly family services and provide weekly flower arrangements.

Annual subscriptions are £25 for a single membership and £40 for joint membership.

Friends receive a membership card, entitling them to visit the cathedral free of charge (excluding ticketed events, concerts or parking). They are sent newsletters and the annual report, Spire, containing information about grants and activities.

And they receive exclusive invitations to a programme of events: talks, day trips, theatre performances and the annual Friends' Day.

Some Fast Facts about our church and history: • The Marnhull mission was founded in 1725. The Hussey family of Nash Court were Catholic converts and were the mainstay of the growing Catholic community in the village.

• In 1795 a community of Benedictine nuns, exiled from Paris, came to Marnhull and rented Nash Court from the Hussey family until 1807 when the Husseys returned to the house and the nuns moved to Cannington in Somerset.

 The Good Shepherd stained-glass windows:
 The stained-glass windows behind the altar in the sanctuary show Our Lord as the Good Shepherd. They were donated by the parish in gratitude and memory of Reverand William Casey who was pastor of Marnhull parish for 42 years. The stained-glass windows were made by

Drake of Exeter and installed in 1875.

BISH'S LETTER Leaves on the line

October is one of those months when the leaves begin to change and fall, and somewhat comical excuses come into conversations about why things don't work. Leaves on the line may well be a technical problem for the railways, but we all know it also means, somewhat ironically, why is it somethings just don't work as they should.

There are often leaves on the line in the life of the church. Why is sometimes things just don't work, especially when we rely upon the grace of God and seek his will? One reason is because we can spend too much time doing, and making mistakes, and not enough time praying. This is not the rather immature prayer of simply asking for this or that the way we want them, but the deeper prayer of spending time with God and being led by his still, small voice. So please do pray in October.

We also suffer from our confusions and distractions because we place the leaves on the line with our judgements and preconceptions, our rulemaking and our creating in our own image. Our track must always lead to Jesus and our mission to make him known.

October 4th is the day the worldwide church remembers St Francis. In his day, the church wasn't working, and in prayer, his vision came to "Rebuild my Church". This was to be achieved by simplicity of life, by generosity to others and total commitment to prayer. His focus was Jesus Christ.

Recently, I was inspired by this vision again with a visit to Hilfield Friary in Dorset, and the licensing of a new Guardian. Hilfield welcomes all; do visit there (although you can't get there by train).

When our frustrations slow us down, we would do well to follow the example of Francis.

Lord God, You made your church rich Through the poverty of blessed Francis: Help us like him not to trust in earthly things But to seek your heavenly gifts; Through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

NEIGHBOURHOOD DEVELOPMENT PLAN



Awareness-raising / consultation We want to ensure that everyone throughout the parish is aware of the Neighbourhood Development Plan so the whole community can play a full part in it as we progress.

In addition to posting our minutes and progress reports on the Marnhull Parish Council website (marnhull-pc.org.uk) we propose to have a regular monthly update in the Messenger – of which this is the first. We are also distributing a flyer to every household in the parish and using facebook and social media.

Remember you can contact us at

marnhullndp@gmail.com. We had a presence at the Flower show and Fest and were grateful to everyone who came and spoke to us and contributed to collating information on important views, pinch points, near misses and accidents, green spaces and green gaps.

This will feed into the plan in due course and we welcome further contributions. We plan to have a competition for 'my favourite view of Marnhull parish, through the seasons' as a way of focusing on what people love about living in Marnhull.

Watch out for this and do take part. Village Groups – We are contacting groups and businesses in the village to raise awareness and collate information about concerns – we particularly want to know how the Neighbourhood Plan can help you.

If you've not heard from us by the end of October please get in touch. Landowners – we are continuing our contact with landowners in the parish to understand their development plans – those whose sites are on the SHLAA map, and others who are not.

Funding & Finance We have been awarded a government grant of £9,860 towards consultants fees. This allows us to employ Jo Witherden, planning consultant who has a wealth of knowledge and local experience. She is steering us in the right path, as well as helping with project development and management.

We aim to use her time as efficiently as possible to get best value from her knowledge and expertise. We are also applying for two Technical Support Packages for which we are eligible. This is professional input paid for under a national government scheme and there will be no cost to the Parish Council for this work. We are aiming to secure support on Design Codes (see below) and Strategic Environmental Assessment.

Other Actions Design Codes – These set out clear guidance for new developments in a simple concise and illustrated way dealing with materials, landscaping, energy performance, layout etc. with an emphasis on development that is sympathetic to our parish area.

This will help to ensure future developments fit with the local character and are future-proofed. An inception meeting and site visit are expected shortly. We have received an initial housing needs analysis from Dorset Council which supports the view that we will not need to put forward development sites other than those which have already secured outline approval.

We intend to undertake a Conservation Area Appraisal to review the current historic buildings and heritage assets of the village. Following a meeting with Dorset Council Transport Planning department we expect to have a site visit with officers including the Road Safety Officer to discuss local concerns. We will be sending out a survey questionnaire in November to every household in the parish.

It will be possible to complete this either on paper or through an online survey. A separate survey will also go out to businesses. The purpose of the surveys is to gauge people's views on a range of issues which will be at the heart of the Neighbourhood Plan including housing, amenities, roads, environment etc.

This will begin the very important process of engaging the whole community in expressing their views about the future of the village and we urge everyone to participate wherever you live in Marnhull and

whatever your views. The Marnhull Neighbourhood Development Plan Steering group September 2023

NEWS FROM TRADING STANDARDS

Single-use plastics ban Single-use plastics are only used once before they're thrown away. The problem with plastic waste is that it doesn't break down, it only breaks up into smaller and smaller parts. This impacts the environment and wildlife for years to come.

According to estimates, England uses 2.7 billion items of single-use cutlery, most of which are plastic, and 721 million single-use plates per year. Of these, only 10% are recycled. If 2.7 billion pieces of cutlery were lined up, they would go round the world over eight and a half times (based on a 15cm piece of cutlery).

Previous efforts to eliminate avoidable plastic waste, include:

One of the world's toughest bans on microbeads in rinse-off personal care products announced in 2018.

Restrictions on the supply of single-use plastic straws, drink stirrers and cotton buds in 2020.

Plastic Packaging Tax in April 2022 whereby a tax of £200 per tonne was introduced on plastic packaging manufactured in, or imported into the UK, that does not contain at least 30% recycled plastic.

 The 5p single-use carrier bag charge, in May 2021 which was increased to a minimum charge of 10p and extended to all retailers, taking billions of bags out of circulation.

Last year the UK Government consulted on banning other types of single use plastic and they reported that over 95% of those who responded to the consultation were in favour of the bans.

So, in October 2023 a new ban on other singe use plastics is set to come into force. The ban will include single-use plastic plates, trays, bowls, cutlery, balloon sticks, and certain types of polystyrene cups and food containers. The ban on these items will include online and over-thecounter sales and supply, from new and existing stock.

It will mean that businesses can no longer supply, sell, or offer these types of single-use plastics to customers. Businesses will need to use alternative options instead. The UK Government announced the ban in January this year, giving businesses time to prepare for the change.

Green Belt

Green Belt is the indispensable solution to climate, nature and food security challenges, says CPRE

Planning, farming and forestry policies need integrating in countryside closest to where people live so that it can protect towns and cities against climate change and enhance nature

New farming subsidies that will pay for environmental improvements should cover at least half of Green Belt land

Acute housing crisis in the countryside means small rural exception sites consisting entirely or primarily of affordable and social housing should be encouraged on the edge of villages within the Green Belt The Green Belt is being overlooked as a pivotal solution to climate change, the decline of nature and food security vulnerabilities, a new report from CPRE, the countryside charity, shows.

The report argues that the Green Belt, which protects 12.5% of England's land area from development, should become greener, wetter and more biodiverse.

Rewiggled streams, new wetlands, restored peatlands, expanded woodland and revived hedgerows could help the countryside around towns and cities soak up more water to protect urban areas from increased floods, droughts and other natural disasters. Food security could be strengthened by creating nature corridors that link rewilding projects with farmland and encouraging people to buy food produced locally that enhances the environment where they live. Tourism and recreation should be encouraged, with better footpaths, facilities and public transport links, so that people get maximum benefit from the improved environment.

State of the Green Belt 2023: A Vision for the 21st Century recommends:

Doubling the amount of Green Belt farmland covered by Environmental Land Management schemes, from the current 28% to over half;

Creating 350,000 hectares overall of new woodland and wetland close to urban areas, in line with recommendations from the Natural Capital Committee;

The proposed Land Use Framework integrate planning, farming and forestry policies and programmes to protect and enhance the countryside close to where people live, particularly in and around our largest towns and cities.

Publish supporting planning practice guidance, underpinned by publicly available and regularly updated data on building rates for large development sites. These can help prevent unnecessary development of Green Belt sites, and also allow the public to see whether the claims made by developers to support Green Belt release have been justified in practice.

The report highlights the need to improve transport links, recreation and tourism in the Green Belt. There is greater need than ever for it to fulfil the founding promise of access to green space, nature and cultural heritage for the populations of nearby towns and cities.

An acute need for more affordable and social housing means rural communities living within the Green Belt should be able to develop small rural exception sites on the edge of villages – even when it is on greenfield land – to accommodate local needs, the report recommends.

But it finds the wrong homes are being built in the wrong places for the wrong people. A sample of thirteen large schemes recently completed or currently being built on former Green Belt land found that only five percent of the housing built was social housing. Also, consistently less affordable housing overall was provided than was called for by local planning policy.

An analysis of the development of land either within the Green Belt, or removed through boundary changes since 2009 so that it could be developed, found that overall Green Belt policy continues to be effective, but also that significant amounts of development are taking place: Just under 208,000 houses in the local planning pipeline awaiting construction; An average of 220 planning applications for large developments of more than ten houses submitted, and at least 9,000 houses built, each year since 2009; Only 12.5% of houses were delivered at affordable or social rents; Brownfield land was marginally more likely to be developed than greenfield land – but in the last two years that trend has flipped, with the majority of land developed now greenfield.

Commenting on the findings, Peter Bowyer, Chair of Trustees at Dorset CPRE said:

'This report is both timely and important. The government needs to commit, in planning policy, to protect and enhance the Green Belt. This would show it is serious about 'brownfield first.' It would also demonstrate its recognition of the enormous value to health and wellbeing of the countryside around our towns and cities.'

'Dorset CPRE strongly opposes the re-drawing of the Green Belt to allow housing developments. Wisely Green Belt areas have been protected from development for the benefit of succeeding generations, yet pressure from Government targets and developers threatens that protection. Meeting housing need appears to be the main 'exceptional circumstance' asserted by Dorset Council to justify building in the Green Belt. Dorset Council has already granted permission for 13,000 homes to be built in Dorset that have yet to be constructed (amounting to about 10 years' of future growth), so we campaign for that land to be used first.'

A hot and sunny afternoon attracted crowds of people to the nine gardens that were open and swelled the charity's coffers by £15,000. The fine weather resulted in fabulous displays of roses and other summer flowers, alongside majestic trees and colourful shrubs. Tea and cake were served at South Canonry, the home of the Bishop of Salisbury, with the £3,156 raised going to the Sudan Medical Link. There was an exhibition of botanical artworks and recorder group Close Consort entertained visitors throughout the afternoon Friends' chairman Duncan Glass was delighted with the result. "What a fantastic result!" he said.




