This free Event, organised by the Patient Participation Groups covering Shaftesbury, Gillingham, Sturminster Newton & Marnhull Surgeries, will be a fantastic opportunity to meet around 50 experts who provide support, advice and information on many health and wellbeing issues.

With the unprecedented pressures on the NHS, people need to better informed about any conditions they have and take as much responsibility as possible in managing their own health.

Men between the ages of 16-60 are less likely to seek medical advice than women. This reluctance means that men often do not seek help until a disease has progressed, which can have serious consequences.

The Men's Health Event is a response to that, providing access to the information, services, support and treatment needed to live healthier, longer and more fulfilling lives.

Practice Pharmacy

The Practice Pharmacy team consists of three Prescribing Pharmacists and four Pharmacy Technicians. They are the first point of call for medicine related questions from patients and practice clinicians and practitioners. They respond to patient symptoms and minor ailments and they review medications, hold patient consultations and in some cases, prescribe.

The team also conducts Asthma reviews as well as HRT, depression and anxiety and pill reviews.

All discharge and hospital letters relating to medication are dealt with by the team as are Nursing home prescriptions.

The aim of all this is to increase patient safety, ensure a consistent and fair medication supplyfor all and to reduce GP workload.

You can contact the Pharmacy team through the Medication section of SystmOnline, through a Kilink submission or by telephone.

And remember that Community Pharmacies Prepare and check all dispensed medication; provide guidance on taking meds and information about interactions etc. They offer minor ailment advice and some provide other services such as vaccinations, smoke stop etc.

There are also opportunities for people to join the research "Steering Group". This group makes sure the research is running smoothly and that targets are being met.

Taking the Environment Around Marnhull Seriously

A bit of bad news to begin with, unfortunately. We are no longer able to accept medicine blister packs at our Saturday morning recycling centre at the Hub. We can still recycle all kinds of things that the Council cannot take - but no more blister packs, please!

This is because Superdrug, who have been taking these packs, have been overwhelmed. They will still accept small quantities at their shops - there will be a collection bin near the pharmacy section - but they do not have the ability to store large quantities until they can be collected and there is a risk that what we collect will end up in land-fill after all.

We do not mean to criticise Superdrug for this - they are still providing a recycling service - but the limits they have imposed are symptomatic of a wider problem. Is it that we - as individuals, as businesses, as Governments - only do what's 'green' until it gets too hard...?

Returning to the Hub recycling centre - behind the Village Hall on Saturday mornings, 10-12, and when the Community Café is open at the Hall, third Fridays 10-12 - we are happy to accept a wide range of other items. But we do have a problem of 'unwanted items in the bagging area'! Our volunteers have to sift through what's dropped off because some things are being left that we cannot take. Please do read what it says on the bins or ask for advice! We know it's complicated, but the contracts with the companies who support this additional recycling are very precise, and we have to abide by them. Thank you for your understanding.

Let's switch to good news, shall we?!

The next Marnhull Green Teams event will be another Electric Vehicle Show, to be held in the Crown carpark by kind permission of the team at the Inn, 10-12 on the morning of Saturday 23 September. As with previous events, this will be an opportunity to chat with neighbours who use electric cars, bikes or vans, and learn from their experience. It will not be a sales event. However, the status quo and his comfortable life was restored when he learnt of Frank's secret, that he was married with a daughter and cheerfully shared the information with his Mam, thus destroying her hopes of happiness in the process.

Bed Among the Lentils' - Tracey'e portrayal of Susan, an alcoholic, nervous vicar's wife was spellbinding, particularly since a clever wig and demeanour meant nobody recognised her when she came on stage and embraced her character. It was easy to feel sympathy for Susan, who has to travel into Leeds to go to the off-licence because of her debts with the local shop keeper. Her relationship with her vainly insensitive husband is difficult and as a distraction has an affair with a nearby grocer, Ramesh, discovering something about herself and God in the process. Susan does not feel cheated when Ramesh moves on to marry and the audience are left hoping she can find some solace in her fling. A truly convincing and touching performance from Tracey.

Congratulations to Graham Renwick, Tracey and James on providing such an enjoyable evening's entertainment. If they can be persuaded to return with a new production, don't miss it and make sure to get your tickets early.

Heritage Theatre's three performances of Alan Bennett's 'Talking Heads' in Marnhull Village Hall – James in 'A Chip In The Sugar' and Tracey in 'Bed Among The Lentils' - came to a close on Sunday 6th August.



Firstly, thank you for supporting St Gregory's Church which has been a presence in the village for nearly 1000 years.

As the PCC of such a beautiful and historic, but expensive to maintain, church, we are acutely aware and often embarrassed that there is a constant need to ask for money for maintenance and repairs. We are also very aware of the current pressures on people's finances.

As you know we receive no state funding, so are reliant on our congregation and the wider village to "keep the ship afloat". We are obliged to pay our Parish Share to the Diocese as well as all the everyday operating costs of the church which in total amounts to around £1,000 per week. Our Church Fete and Gift Day are our main annual fund-raising events.

As you may know we have a plan to re-order the west end of the Church, by creating a flexible "social" space and refurbishing the kitchen area to enable hospitality and freer movement within the building as well as providing accessible toilet facilities. In addition, the Church desperately needs re-wiring and re-lighting before anything else can happen.

As a Grade 1 listed building there are several surveys which have already been done including an asbestos survey, a detailed inspection of the nationally significant mediaeval wall paintings and an archaeological inspection to ascertain how we can progress the plans. We feel it is important that you understand why every donation matters.

BISHOP'S LETTER



God's own field

Harvest, in the agricultural sense, is well past. All is safely (or soggily) gathered in and the appealing blocks of barley and hay baling our landscape into a pop-up sculpture park have all but disappeared.

The Church's Harvest celebrations – extended as a 'Creationtide' season into October – are in one sense, then, a delayed thanksgiving for the yield of former months. That needn't trouble us, however, for they are just as much focused on a rather less specific future point: the anticipated end of the world believers know as the Last Judgement. For many, this is merely one of the vestiges of a Christian worldview with little bearing on present times, a sickle blade blunted by unbelief.

Nevertheless, the idea of a harvest that separates the righteous from the unrighteous often crops up in Jesus' teaching and has gained a new edge as we witness the ecological ends of our actions, more fearfully evident with each passing, and slightly warmer, year. The once-familiar Parable of the Wheat and the Tares tells us that good and evil inevitably grow together in this life: one is easy to mistake for the other and this fact should caution us away from prejudice or self-righteousness. But it is also a warning that the real myth is the one that imagines our actions have no lasting or eternal consequences. They do, they will - and to ignore this is simply to hasten the day.

STURMINSTER NEWTON HERITAGE TRUST

Local history enthusiasts and friendly faces wanted!

Calling all history lovers! The Sturminster Newton Heritage Trust (SNHT), which cares for the local museum as well as Sturminster Newton Mill, is seeking enthusiastic volunteers to dedicate a few hours each week to the charity.

The Museum, which is entirely run by volunteers and is free for everyone to enjoy, chronicles the history of the local area from the Romans to the present day. With regularly changing exhibitions on different aspects of local history, and a fascinating collection of objects on display, Sturminster Newton Museum seeks to provoke feelings of nostalgia for long-time residents, inspire a new generation to learn about local history, and provide interest and entertainment to visitors passing through the town.

Meanwhile at Sturminster Newton Mill, specially trained millers lead guided tours of the historic space, while keeping heritage skills alive with Milling Weekends, where visitors can see flour milled using traditional methods – later available to purchase in the shop. Whether they've travelled miles for a long-awaited tour of the mill, or just popped by on their weekend stroll to picnic by the mill pond, visitors are treated to a warm welcome four days a week from March – September by the friendly team of volunteer stewards.

The Sturminster Newton Heritage Trust also works in partnership with local schools to involve young people in research projects, work experience, and opportunities to connect with the history and heritage of the place where they live. Most recently Sturminster Newton High School students took part in the Trust's Swanskin Seafarers of Sturminster research project, connecting with young people in Newfoundland, Canada, who had shared North Dorset heritage with them.

All of this work is made possible due to the hard work of volunteers – local people with a few hours to spare each week who take on roles in the museum and mill. Volunteers come in all shapes and sizes, and everyone has different skills and experience to contribute.



Whether you're a keen baker who could contribute fresh scones to a fundraising cream tea, or a friendly people-person who would love to spend a few days greeting visitors to the mill or museum, the Sturminster Newton Heritage Trust would love to hear from you. If neither of those roles sound appealing, the SNHT is always looking for muscle power – erecting gazebos and lifting chairs to help set up for community events and summer holiday activities.

NEIGHBOURHOOD DEVELOPMENT PLAN

What is a Neighbourhood Development Plan?

Neighbourhood development plans (NDPs) are a way of helping local communities to influence planning in the area in which they live and work.

NDPs can be used to:

- Develop a shared vision for your neighbourhood.
- Choose where new homes, shops, offices and other development should be built.
- Identify and protect important local green spaces.
- Influence what new buildings should look like.
- Influence decisions on traffic and transport; footpaths; local facilities; use of renewable energy, etc.

Who is leading the Marnhull NDP?

Marnhull Parish Council is leading the plan through a steering group. The steering group reports regularly to the PC and its minutes can be found on the Marnhull Parish Council website marnhull-pc.org.uk/neighbourhood-plan/. The steering group is supported by a professional consultant experienced in neighbourhood plans in Dorset.

Who is on the NDP Steering Group?

The Steering Group is: Jules Cormack (Chair), Stephen Boyce (Secretary), Adrian Bailey, Anna Fraser, Steve Penson, Francesca Pratt, Mark Turner, Sarah Lyster.

Will I get a chance to express my views?

The process of developing the NDP is consultative so that the plan represents the broad consensus of the community as a whole.

The steering committee wishes to hear the views of individuals, organisations, businesses and landowners throughout Marnhull and there will be opportunities to contribute, both formal and informal, including surveys and public meetings at various stages during the process.

How long will the NDP take?

It is estimated that the work will take 18 months to two years to complete. Once the plan is drafted it must be approved by Dorset Council and will be subject to a local (parish-wide) referendum.

Will it make any difference?

The NDP is an important tool in helping manage development across the village. Once adopted it must be taken into account when planning applications are being determined.

Can I get involved?

The steering group will need the support of volunteers during the process of drawing up the NDP.

MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIR OF THE PARISH COUNCIL

Firstly, can I say thank you to all those in the village that have wished me well since I was elected Chair of the Marnhull Parish Council (MPC) back in May.

I have had time to reflect, meet and listen to lots of people and I thought it was sensible to put my thoughts down on paper for people in the Village to read. The Parish Council is in a difficult position; the first point of call for those wishing to complain about or object to something or some development in the village, yet, more often than not, without the requisite powers to make a difference. All we can do is to continue to influence, chase and push others to get the outcomes that we want. This uses up a lot of time, energy, and goodwill with only a small chance of success and, over time, we lose heart and the enthusiasm to keep pushing. I decided to stand as Chair of the MPC because I think I can make a difference to help the MPC and the village face today's key challenges. These are:

·Planning – we should assume that the recent stream of large and small planning applications will keep coming; therefore, we must continue the valuable work of reviewing and, where necessary, objecting to those applications. One of the things that the MPC can do to help is to sponsor the development of the Neighbourhood Plan (see next point). If you feel strongly about a particular application, it is always worth putting in a comment of your own via the Dorset Council planning website. We have provided some help and advice ion making those comments and it can be found on the MPC website: https://marnhull-pc.org.uk/how-to-comment-on-planning-applications/

·Neighbourhood Plan – this is a vital plank in the village's response to planning applications. Producing a plan is a long and difficult process; I am therefore delighted that Jules Cormack has agreed to lead the development of the Neighbourhood Plan. I have been really impressed with the team that has come forward to help and the energy and enthusiasm shown so far can only bode well for the future.

All villagers will have a role to play in this process; not least participation in the consultations that are planned over the next year or so. Please do everything you can to respond to these consultations.

High levels of village engagement are vital to creating a great plan but also showing others outside of the village how determined we are to make it happen.

·S106 commitments – like it or not, the planning applications that have already been approved will be completed. The challenge for us is to ensure we get the benefits from those developments. In the short time I have been looking at the S106 agreements and the processes that sit around it, inaction on our part may lead to the community losing out on the commitments that have been made by the developers. Again, we will continue to push, enquire, chase, and secure the funds as the developments progress. I will ensure that we will provide regular updates as the developments move from planning consent into actual physical development.

·Keep doing the day-to-day work – I am not sure everyone understands what the MPC does around the allotments, recreation ground, cemetery, defibrillators, and other areas of the village. Over the next few months, I will be asking councillors to also write short articles for the Messenger about their areas of responsibility so that you can be as well informed about all the essential works that the MPC does. Over the next couple of months, we will have articles on:

oThe Councillors and their responsibilities

oThe MPC budget - how do we form a budget and what does it contain?

·Engagement – something I am passionate about. I believe there is more we can do to make the MPC and its councillors as visible and available as we can. I have been pleased to see good attendance at the MPC meetings. (I'm sure it was the content of the agenda rather than the new Chair that improved attendances) and it was great to see our stand at the Fest and Flower Show so well attended. You will have noted of course that the MPC team took first prize in the Great Marnhull Village Bake Off – well done Louella! I intend to visit as many local societies, schools, and events as I can so that I can see first-hand what happens and give you an opportunity to say hello. If you want me to pay a visit, please drop me a line at mark. turner@marnhull-pc.org.uk and I will see what I can do.

Finally, a little bit about how I work and think. I still work full time so I will have to manage my MPC responsibilities carefully. I am a pretty level headed person and can cope with most of what is thrown at me.

However, things that do irritate me particularly include impolite and unprofessional behaviour. But... I like working in teams and believe that small, motivated teams can bring about big changes and have fun at the same time; that is what I would like the MPC to do.


St Francis'

Cyclists raise over £30,000 after completing Wiltshire to Devon challenge

A group of cyclists who travelled over 100 miles from Wiltshire to Devon have raised over £30,000 for the Stars Appeal, Salisbury District Hospital's Charity.

The Unlikely Cyclists made up of William Warden, John Matthews, Andy Hillier, Matt Oakes, Mike and Elaine Davis, Nick Cordel, Matt Hurley, Alistair Fenwick, Wayne Davis, Tristan Warden and Chris Combe, completed the challenge over two days.

William, from Devizes, came up with the idea of doing the challenge after his wife Sarah was diagnosed with breast cancer last year and cared for at the Stars Appeal funded Breast Unit. After telling friends of his plan, they were keen to support him, and the Unlikely Cyclists were formed.

Explaining more about what spurred him on to fundraise for Salisbury District Hospital's Charity, William said: "Sarah was diagnosed with Breast Cancer in late 2022 and while sitting in Salisbury Hospital's Breast Unit, one grey and damp morning, I read through the list of companies and individuals who had donated to fund the unit to provide a calm and peaceful atmosphere for treatment, and felt I would like to do something to help. The care Sarah received from the dedicated team of nurses was faultless."

Members of the group visited the Breast Unit at the Hospital on Monday, August 9 for a special cheque presentation and also had a talk about the charity's work.

The group, whose ages range from under 30 to over 70, set off from Marston near Devizes on Thursday, July 13 where they headed to Axminster then on to Mortonhampsted on the edge of Dartmoor the next day.

William said: "When we got to Axminster we were fairly tired, but we all made it. The weather on the Friday was a big challenge. Everyone was glad they did it," adds William, who had initially set up a JustGiving page with a target of £5,000 and was "amazed" as the fundraising total continued to grow.

"We never envisaged getting anywhere near that amount. To get over £30,000 we were astonished.

We hope it will make a difference to a lot of people.

"We can't thank everyone who supported us enough."

The Stars Appeal aims to raise over £1million each year to fund projects offering direct, practical support to patients, their families, and the Hospital's staff.

Alongside its Breast Unit the charity has provided the Hospital with additional CT and MRI scanners and a range of new facilities including an enhanced Children's Unit and Cardiac Suite.

Donations also help fund projects supporting cancer patients, including free aromatherapy, headwear for patients who lose their hair, free drinks for chemotherapy and oncology outpatients, and a prehabilitation programme offering one-to-one support to help patients prepare for surgery and treatment.

Dave Cates said: "We are so grateful to William and Sarah, and all of the cyclists and their supporters, for raising such an incredible sum for our charity. It will enable us to continue our work enhancing care for thousands of patients every week at Salisbury Hospital and supporting their families and the NHS staff that care for them."

Colin Shiner opened his programme with a contemplative piece by Elgar for strings and harp called "Sospiri". It was followed by a song by The Scorpion Band, a Dorset original talent which is well known for its collection of traditional songs. Called "The Hard Times of Old England" it bewails the fate of soldiers returning from the Napoleonic wars who found there was little employment for them.

A bit later Colin played the 3rd movement of Rachmaninov's 2nd symphony dating from 1908. Surely there is no more lyrical, graceful and utterly perfect piece of music than this spellbinding melody.

After "Don't cry for me, Argentina" from Andrew Lloyd Webbers "Evita" the first half ended with the ethereal and dreamlike 3rd movement of Mahler's 5th Symphony.

Colin promised us a less introspective second half and he delivered by playing "The Lion and Albert" recited by Stanley Holloway, just to prove that our society is not forbiddingly high-brow. The delicious quartet "Bella figlia dell'amore" from Verdi's Rigoletto which came next was the highlight of the programme for me. Colin had interestingly discovered a piano piece by Liszt which paraphrased the previous melody.

The Vaughan Williams "Norfolk Rhapsody No. 1" which followed was unfamiliar to nearly all of his audience. Several of us back-row critics felt that it definitely captured the sense of wind and big skies usually associated with East Ánglia and would be worth further study.

After the solemn and thought-provoking "Benedictus" from Karl Jenkins' The Armed Man with its hint of mediaeval plainsong, Colin sent us off into the warm evening with three very contrasting versions of the can-can.

Our next meeting will be in September and we urge anyone who enjoys music of a generally "classical" nature to come along and visit us for an evening.

MARNHULL WOMENS' INSTITUTE

It is plain that Clyde Jones is passionate about the concept of regenerative farming. In his talk entitled "Farming from the soil upwards" he told the story of his boyhood home on a smallholding with just a cow and a few chickens and ducks and, unusually, a racoon. From this beginning via years of study at different institutions he became interested in the culture of pasture quality. Who knew there was so much to learn about grasslands?

I feel thoroughly incompetent to relay even the most rudimentary content of this talk. It ranged over soil chemistry, root formation, different types of grasses and their needs, grazing patterns, fodder plants and much more. From my position of ignorance, however, I did manage to capture a few bullet points: the best way to keep your pasture healthy is (1) avoid tilling, (2) limit the time the animals are allowed to graze each patch, (3) avoid compacting the soil and (4) study the nature

of the soil and the grasses in your area before deciding what fertilizer best unlocks the organic potential of the land. I hope that anyone from the farming community who reads this will forgive so sketchy a report on what was obviously a fact-filled hour. But from henceforth I will look at a field with a slightly more discerning eye.

NEWS FROM TRADING STANDARDS

Age restricted sales

There are laws that restrict the sale of certain products and services to underage people. Just some of these age restricted products and services are:

Minimum age 18 – Alcohol, fireworks, knives, vapes and tobacco.

Minimum age 16 – Aerosol paint and petrol.

Minimum age 12 – DVDs and computer games with a 12 aged classification.

There are concerns about the potential availability of age restricted products to young people, and of

the personal and social implications that come from buying them underage. Trading Standards

enforce the law for many different types of products, helping to keep young people safe, and

communities protected from anti-social behaviour.

Retailers know that they shouldn't sell age restricted goods to people younger than allowed. They

are encouraged to put systems in place to make sure that they don't sell illegally. Challenge 25 is one

such system that can be used. Shop staff are trained to always ask for ID from a person who looks

younger than 25. If that is followed closely, then sales to people younger than 18 should not be

made. Other processes can include having a refusals 'book' to demonstrate that sales are being

refused, and by which members of staff. Posters can also be displayed that state that ID will be

requested. Some shops have till prompts that put a sale on hold until the seller has had a proper look

at the buyer to determine their age.


