

Marnhull Parish Council NEEDS YOU To be a Parish Councillor

Marnhull Parish Council have vacancies for new Parish Councillors. There is a limit of 11 Councillors and a requirement of a minimum of 4 for the Council to be quorate (to be allowed to function).

The Roles and Responsibilities of a Parish/Town Council

Generally the role of a parish council is to improve the quality of community life for their parish and its inhabitants. They can:

- Give views on behalf of their community), on planning applications and other proposals that affect the parish.
- Undertake projects and schemes that benefit local residents
- Work in partnership with other bodies to achieve benefits for the parish.
- Alert relevant authorities to problems that arise or work that needs to be
- · Help the other tiers of local government keep in touch with their local communities.

Can I become a Parish Councillor?

You can make a difference by working with your Parish Council, by becoming a Councillor or by just working close together.

DO YOU WANT TO MAKE A DIFFERENCE?

Oualifications

A person is qualified to become a parish councillor if:

L He or she is a British subject, or a citizen of the Irish Republic or other Euronational and on the day he/she is nominated as a candidate for election, is over 18 and an elector.

2 During the whole of the 12 months preceding his or her nomination day, or the day of that election, resided or had his/her principal place of work in the parish or town, or within 3 miles (4.8 kilometers) of it.

A person may not become a parish councillor if:

I. They hold a paid office or other place of profit in the gift of the Council.

- 2. They have been declared bankrupt in the past five years and have not repaid their debts
- 3. They have been convicted of a criminal offence and sentenced to not less than 3 months imprisonment (including any suspended sentence) within the past 5 years.

Ideal Health Exhibition

The Ideal Health Exhibition - Live Life to the Full, was a tremendous success and many thanks to everyone who came along and supported us. If you were able to go along to the Exchange, we very much hope you enjoyed the event and found it both interesting and a good opportunity to have many of your queries regarding various medical, social and wellbeing issues answered.

If you were unable to come along to the Exhibition, a brochure was produced with details of all the 39 exhibitors, as well as information about the services offered by the Practice. Please pick up a copy from reception in Marnhull, Sturminster Newton Medical Centre or the Marnhull Hub. It's a useful resource about local organisations who can help with your health and wellbeing.

Primary Care Network

The Blackmore Vale Partnership and Gillingham Practice are now a Primary Care Network (PCN) covering around 38,000 patients. PCNs aim to integrate GP Practices with hospitals and community services - more of a joined-up service. They will provide a wider range of services to patients, involving a wider set of staff roles, for example, first contact physiotherapy, extended access and social prescribing. The areas our PCN will focus on are frailty, Population Health and Severe Mental illness checks.

There are 2 crimes to report since the last issue of Messenger - the theft of a John Deere tractor mower and the barn fire which is currently being investigated.

SCAMS

In August, a scam involving people purporting to be from high street banks, ie Lloyds, Nat West, where elderly residents were contacted, by phone, and advised that there was a problem with their cards or that their cards were due for replacement. The callers arranged to collect the original cards from the victim's home addresses and in 2 cases were able to obtain PIN numbers and withdraw monies from their accounts. Treat all such phone calls with suspicion!

PLEASE BE ADVISED THAT A BANK WOULD NEVER SEND ANYONE TO YOUR HOME TO COLLECT BANK CARDS AND OBTAIN YOUR PIN NUMBER.

Other scams continue either by email, post or by phone. Phone calls can sound very convincing **NEVER** give out personal details – you do not know who you are talking to! **DO NOT** engage with these unscrupulous people and HANG UP!

HANG UP ON FRAUDSTERS! DO NOT ENGAGE WITH THESE UNSCRUPULOUS SCAMMERS!

To protect yourself from scam calls some providers offer a call guardian service or you can purchase phones that have call blocker. Do you have caller ID? Do you know who is calling? If you don't know who is calling let the call go to your answering machine/service – this will enable you to vet your calls.





Significant dates in October

1 - Saint Therese of the Child Jesus (1873-1897)

Therese was born at Alencon and at the age of 15 entered the Carmel of Lisieux. Although she died of tuberculosis at the age of 24, such was the influence of her spiritual writings and her 'little way', that she was declared a Doctor of the Church in 1997. She is also Patron of the Missions and Co-Protectress of France (with St Joan of Arc).

4 - Saint Francis of Assisi (c.1181-1226)

Son of a wealthy merchant, he embraced poverty and preached to love of God to all. In 1210 he set up the Order of Friars Minor (Franciscans) and two years later helped St Clare to establish a female community (Poor Clares). While praying at La Verna he received the wounds of the crucified Lord, which caused him great pain in his final years.

4 - CAFOD Harvest Fast Day (Friday)

For the poor and hungry of the world, that they may have access to food fairly traded.

13 – Day of Prayer for Prisoners and their Dependants

For all in prison and their families, that they may know the Lord's compassion.

15 - Saint Teresa of Jesus (1515-1582)

Joined the Carmelite convent at Avila and after 25 years as a nun, began to reform the Order, with the help St John of the Cross. Her outstanding works and mystical theology led to her being declared a Doctor of the Church in 1970.

17 - Saint Ignatius of Antioch (died c.107)

Followed St Peter as bishop of Antioch and was thrown to wild beasts in Rome, during the persecution of Trajan. His name is mentioned in the Roman Canon.

18 - Saint Luke, Evangelist (Feast)

St Luke (1st C) was a Greek, possibly from Antioch, who trained as a doctor. He converted to Christianity, became a disciple of St Paul and wrote both a Gospel and the Acts of the Apostles.

28 - Saints Simon and Jude, Apostles (Feast)

St Simon (1st C) is usually called 'the Canaanite' and 'the Zealot', suggesting he belonged to the Jewish party of the 'Zealous of the Law'.

St Jude or Thaddeus (1st C) has a short epistle in the New Testament ascribed to him and is invoked as the patron of hopeless causes.

Tradition says that after Pentecost they evangelised, Simon in Egypt, Jude in Mesopotamia, and then both in Persia where they were martyred. Their names appear in the Roman Canon.

Anthony John Randall's funeral was on 6 September and John Joseph Priestly's and September and Septfuneral was on 10 September. Both were held at Yeovil Crematorium. RIP Betty Doney's funeral will be held at St Benedict's on 2 October. RIP

Speeding A reply from the Parish Council

In last month's issue, Mr Nagle wrote an article raising concerns about speeding traffic through our village. Whilst I have some sympathy with his comments, I feel there is a need to address some of his concerns.

I shall start with the comment regarding Salisbury Street and "traffic travelling up to sixty miles an hour". I am sure most of you reading this will have also read in past issues of the Messenger that the village now has an active Community Speed Watch group. Whilst the group does not monitor Salisbury Street, it does so in two locations on Crown Road. If there were a significant volume of traffic achieving sixty miles an hour along that stretch of road, the group would have recorded such incidents. Only two vehicles out of 857 monitored have been reported speeding and those were both only just above the threshold.

I am not belittling Mr Nagle's comments, but pointing out the reality is that there isn't currently a major speeding issue in our village that can be identified. It is often the proximity to the traffic itself and/or the narrowness of the highway that exaggerates the perception of speed.

Mr Nagle goes on to guestion speed limits within the village. On this point I do have some sympathy, in that I, too, believe that a lower speed limit along Crown Road and Salisbury Street would be desirable. However, there is much more involved than 'just' putting up new speed limit signs. Any change to a highway speed limit has to be backed up by evidence (and, no, this does not have to include injuries or deaths). This evidence then has to be put forward in a case which eventually ends up with a change in legislation no less! This is a costly and lengthy process. The evidence gathering has already begun through the Speed Watch data. We need to gather a year's worth of actual speed monitoring data as a start.

However, changing speed limits is not a guarantee of road safety. I believe a change in motorist behaviour is much more effective. Someone who drives at sixty mph through a forty mph area is unlikely to change their speeding habit just because of a reduction of speed limit. One approach the Parish Council is considering is the use of Speed Indication Devices (SIDs) which are signs by the roadside that inform you (and other motorists/ pedestrians) of your speed. As Mr Nagle points out, you will probably have noticed these recently as you travel through Hinton St Mary and East Stour amongst other places. These devices have proved to be very effective at reducing incidents of speeding. The Speed Watch data being collected now will give the Parish Council a steer as to whether one or more SID in the village would be effective. It has to be pointed out that these devices have to be purchased, installed and maintained, for which the Parish (i.e. yourselves) would have to pay through the annual precept.

It is not a case of "Banging on the District Council's door", not only as there is no longer a District Council but also it is Dorset County Council Highways department that would be the door to batter down. The Parish Council is in continual discussions with the Highways department as anyone who attends or reads the minutes of the Parish Council meetings would know. The Parish Council and Highways are aware of the concerns of the village and are working together on the strategy outlined above, i.e. analysis of Speed Watch data, possible installation of SIDs. On top of that, discussions have taken place concerning reduction of the speed limit in front of St Gregory's school and church. Unfortunately these have been frustrated by the inability to place appropriate signage.

Lastly, Mr Nagle quite rightly points out that should any (or all, God forbid) the development applications be approved, it would place a greater strain on the village as far as road safety is concerned. The Parish Council has been doing all in its power to counter these large, opportunistic, developments with arguments around road safety amongst other things.

I hope this letter has addressed many of Mr Nagle's concerns; the Parish Council is not sitting idly by.

We are proactively seeking to improve road safety within the village against a background of Local Government cuts and County Council reorganisations which tends to make life a little more difficult.

Scams are fraud and many people are contacted by criminals by post, phone, online or on the doorstep. Over half of people 65+ have been targeted by criminal scams. Age UK found that worryingly only 5% of people report scams, so 95% of people don't. Silence is a scammers best friend as it allows perpetrators of these crimes to continue unchallenged and victims to remain unsupported.

There is a scam for everyone and anyone can be affected. Young people can be scammed when buying a first mobile phone or paying online letting agents for student accommodation. Older people may fall for fake lotteries, prize draws and catalogue scams. Others may lose money when contacted out of the blue by someone purporting to be from

People who are more vulnerable to scams can receive multiple contacts a day by fraudsters and there are many reasons why people reply. Some feel they have an obligation to respond to letters or enjoy the routine of opening and responding to post. Some people want to receive the cheque for their promised winnings.

Friends Against Scams aims to break the silence around scams, giving people information to be able to spot the signs of a scam, talk with and support others and report scams. It is a national and growing scheme that aims to recruit 1 million 'Friends' by 2020.






