

Following last month's report that the Blackmore Vale Inn had been sold subject to contract, we can now confirm that this sale has fallen through, as the two parties were unable to reach an agreement.

We approached Hall and Woodhouse to ask if it was still their intention to sell the Inn as a Public House. There seems to be an increasing feeling in the village that the Brewery is reluctant to sell the pub as a free house, as it would be in competition with The Crown, at the other end of the village. We pointed out that the Blackmore Vale Inn is an important community asset and that Marnhull is large enough to support two pubs.

Estates Manager, Peter Kitching responded – "The property is still very much for sale and we are currently in advanced negotiations with another interested party who informs us that it is their intention to run the pub. I hope we will have instructed solicitors in the next couple of weeks."

The moment a child learns to read he or she opens a treasure chest of ideas, information, imagination and adventure. That was the theme of Jill Keiran and Pat Budden's talk entitled "Reading Matters". They recalled the earliest books which had inspired and excited them, from "Railway Children" to "Wind in the Willows" and which included, as it did for many of their listeners, the whole library of Enid Blyton's ripping schoolgirl yarns. Some years later the pangs of young love were reflected in Dodie Smith's "I Captured the Castle".

Books can reflect the world we live in and help us make sense of it, or they can open a gateway to unfamiliar experiences and vistas. Jill and Pat expressed sadness that some people decline to explore the wonderful opportunities on offer.

If someone is unsure where to start in the bewildering tumult of the printed word, there are some internet sites which can help. Quick reads offers short pieces of writing, and Love Reading gives a choice of ten extracts from books so that a reader can pick something which catches his fancy.

Jill and Pat, along with several of their audience, are members of a reading group and they echoed all our feelings when they said how very much they enjoyed the involvement. The problem with selecting books for oneself is that there is a tendency to go back to familiar authors and subjects. It can be hard to break away from habit but in our book group we try to choose writing in every genre for our annual programme and it is in the very newness of the reading experience that the excitement lies. If you have never read any biography, try "A Scandalous Life" by Mary S.Lovell. If you want to try recent history try "The Hare with Amber Eyes" by Edmund de Wall. For an easy read and a Dorset connection try "The Novel in the Viola" by Natasha Solomons.

I could go on and on because the list of inspiring and absorbing reading material is literally endless because it is being constantly replenished. Ask any one of the WI reading Group for a list of suggestions. Good Reading!

We are pleased to welcome Dr Lucy Bowden to the practice. Dr Bowden will be based at Sturminster Newton.

Proposed Merger

Following initial discussions, The Blackmore Vale Partnership (Shaftesbury and Sturminster Newton/Marnhull) and Stalbridge Surgery are formally proposing a merger in order to ensure patients can continue to receive high standards of care in the future.

Dr Simon Horner, The Blackmore Vale Partnership said "With the NHS nationally facing increased pressure, a crisis in GP recruitment and budget constraints, it makes sense for both practices to consider working more closely together and enjoying the benefits this will bring including – more choice and flexibility for patients, more effective use of GP time and greater negotiating power with the NHS to ensure the best possible services for our patients. We would like to ask patients registered at both practices to support this merger as we believe it will have great benefits for the communities in North Dorset".

Dr Steve Clayton, Stalbridge Surgery said "We understand that patients and staff may be anxious about the proposed merger, however we see this as a really positive move for both practices. This will help us to ensure sustainability of primary care services for the future for both populations as well as looking at new and improved ways of delivering healthcare more locally. I am pleased that succession of primary health care services will be secured for the 4400 patients of Stalbridge Surgery. This proposed merger is a result of twelve months of negotiations to ensure this continuation. At the time of the merger I will be leaving Stalbridge after over 24 years to pursue a more relaxed future within general practice".

The next stage of the process will involve teams from The Blackmore Vale Partnership and Stalbridge Surgery working closely with Dorset Clinical Commissioning Group, NHS England, patient groups and other partners to ensure the merger is in the best interests of local patients and those working within the healthcare community.



On February 3rd the Resonate Strings, a group of 5 musicians each representing one of the 5 string sections of the Bournemouth Symphony Orchestra came to Marnhull to do 2 concerts.

In the afternoon, sponsored by their own outreach programme, Artsreach and Marnhull Entertains, the group gave a workshop for the top Junior pupils from St Gregory's School, Marnhull, St Mary's Catholic School, Marnhull and Stower Provost School. Using a time machine (the Dr Who theme) the group took the children on a history tour of music and the instruments that each member of the group played. There were opportunities for some children to take part, a question and answer session and a song to join in with. It was a wonderful opportunity for the children to see and hear a group of professional musicians and was much enjoyed by all 3 schools.

After a refreshment break and some serious practice time, in the evening the group played to a packed audience in St Gregory's Church. The programme 'reflected the wonderful diversity of the classical string repertoire with music from Vivaldi, Brahms, Mozart, Puccini, Handel and Piazzolla. The BSO sent along one of their own team to provide the links between the pieces of music and information about the composers. It was a superb concert and the audience were thrilled with the experience, many asking for more. Marnhull Entertains in co-operation with Artsreach hope that similar concerts can be arranged in the future.

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




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
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Thoughts from the Methodist Minister...

Dear Friends.

John Hull is a name that might not be familiar to many reading this article – and if that is the case, then I encourage you to find out more about this remarkable individual. Although John died (aged 80 years) in the summer of 2015, his name is in the news at the moment because a documentary film based on John's life has been nominated for three BAFTAs (British Academy of Film and Television Arts) and has won the British Independent Film Awards 'Best Documentary' prize.

The film, 'Notes on Blindness' is based on hours of audio recordings made by John in the early 1980's after he quite suddenly lost his sight (aged 45 years). John was a theologian and teacher - he studied at Cambridge and became Professor of Religious Education at Birmingham University. He was responsible for helping to shape religious education in schools and went on to train clergy in both the Methodist Church and Church of England. John had a brilliant career ahead of him when he lost his sight - it was a devastating blow. After losing sight, John knew that if he did not try to understand blindness it would destroy him, so he began keeping an audio diary. Over three years John recorded many hours of material, a unique testimony of loss, rebirth and renewal, exploring the interior world of blindness. This work was eventually published as a book in 1990, 'Touching the Rock'.

As many of you know, in recent months I have been recovering from a serious road accident – it has been a hard time and I have felt acutely the loss of freedom and mobility. I am making a good (but slow!) recovery. The film is a powerful aid which helps us to enter (just a little) into the world that John Hull, and many others, live in day-to-day. This story of loss seems so appropriate for this time of the Christian calendar as we enter the season of Lent. We hear again the story of Jesus - the One who lost so much - friends, freedom, dignity and ultimately, his life on the cross. His loss did not lead to him blaming God, or cursing others. Instead, the cross became the place where New Life could begin.

If you are able, try to watch the film, 'Notes on Blindness' or get a copy of the book on which it is based – 'Touching the Rock'. If you can't do these things, pause for a moment and give thanks for the gifts you enjoy, but... also acknowledge some of the things you may have lost – a friend, a measure of health & strength, a relationship, financial security, perhaps you have impaired vision or are losing your sight. John Hull's life began again when he lost his sight - his passionate and practical faith in the God his 'Rock' gave him the resources to continue his former life and also be 'born again' and discover something entirely new.

My prayer is that through this Lent and Easter, we will all be given the grace to cope with loss and discover Life...





Garden Reflections for the month of...



...March

Grey squirrels!! – delightful to watch but they can be an absolute nuisance in the garden. In our last home we suffered the predations of deer, pigeons, pheasants, mice, and rabbits, and of foxes (attacking our chickens) but no squirrels or moles. Here in Marnhull we have not (yet!) been pestered by deer but grey squirrels have taken their place.

They were introduced to the UK from North America about 140 years ago and have thrived ever since, partly due to being adaptable in various environments and to immunity from the parapox virus which affects the native red squirrel. They are nearly twice the weight of red squirrels and are far more acrobatic, often seen running along wires, walls, rooves, and other obstacle courses to reach food. Apparently they have amazing memories and can remember up to 400 sites where they have stored nuts and other food.

In the garden squirrels will eat fruit, seeds, nuts, flower buds, vegetables, corms, bulbs, strip bark from trees especially sycamore, maple, ash, and beech, and I also found that they chewed through the jute string tying up my peas and beans!

They often raid bird feeders, attack birds'nests taking eggs and/or fledglings, and if they find a suitable gap they will enter house attics and cause all sorts of problems there too such as nibbling through electrical wires. We know of someone who was alerted by piercing screaming from a grey squirrel trapped in a wire bird feeder! It took courage, thick gloves, and wire cutters to get it out!

So what can we do about them? As they are classified as a damaging nonnative species grey squirrels can be legitimately killed and if they are trapped they cannot legally be released alive so humane traps can only be used if you are then prepared to kill the squirrel. Air rifles (if you are a good shot) and spring traps are considered as humane ways of dispensing of them. However, probably most of us don't have the stomach to dispense with the furry creatures so it boils down to methods of distraction or physical barriers to deter them.

I have tried squirrel-proof bird feeders but found that the wily animals became adept at knocking the feeders to and fro to scatter the seed on the ground. My next attempt will be to make a cage for the feeders with squirrel-proof netting and/or use dome-shaped baffles on the poles below the feeders (ok as long as squirrels cannot leap onto them from branches or walls). Another deterrent to protect bird food is to mix chilli powder with the bird seed – apparently the birds don't mind but squirrels do!

Methods of keeping squirrels from damaging trees include putting a fake owl in the tree, spreading prickly prunings such as brambles, berberis, etc around trees or fitting 'skirts' of chicken wire with sharp ends protruding around the base of trees.

To prevent squirrels digging up bulbs, a layer of chicken wire can be secured over the soil or the area can be scattered with chicken manure, chilli flakes, cayenne pepper, or moth balls. I haven't yet tried any of these methods but it sounds as if a nice hot manure curry might be on the cards soon!

Our youngest children in Hedgehogs have enjoyed incorporating 'Frozen' into their learning. They have made a 'Polar Explore' area where they have been learning about the animals that live in the artic. They have been busy making snowflakes and penguins as well as going for walks in the frost.

Year 1 children in Rabbits class were all desperate to become explorers and hike to the North and South Pole to set up camp. Unfortunately this was not possible so they had a visit from Commander James Risley of the Royal Navy who had been to the North Pole in his submarine. We were very fortunate to have the Bournemouth Symphony Orchestra Resonate Strings come into school to give a concert to all of our Key Stage 2 children. Children from St Mary's and Stower Provost joined us for the concert and we thank Mrs Cooper-Hammond for organising it all.

Badgers class have been learning about the Ice Age, Creatures of the Ice Age, Ice Age hunters and Captain Scott and wrote non-fiction texts, including newspaper reports about the demise of the Woolly Mammoths. They have also learned how to write Haiku poems describing a winter scene and painted some lovely winter scenes to accompany their Haiku poems.

Our 'Kune Kune' pigs have arrived and settled well in their new home. Children are in the process of naming them and we will let you know next time the names they have chosen!

We were all very excited about the introduction to our new school topic 'Boing! Boing!' On the first day back after half term the children had a surprise awaiting them! The day began with a whole circus skills demonstration in the hall. Steve from 'Circus into Schools' demonstrated lots of circus skills such as juggling, plate spinning and tightrope walking.

Throughout the day each class enjoyed a workshop with Steve where they had the chance to learn some circus skills for themselves. 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WW1 Commemoration - Arthur Curtis

A memorial service for Arthur Curtis, one of the men on Marnhull's War Memorial, will be held at 11:50am on the 100th anniversary of Arthur's death, Monday 24th April, at All Saints church, Banstead, Surrey, as part of Banstead's World War One commemorations.

Arthur was born at home at Brickyard Cottage, Musbury Lane, Marnhull, on 6th July 1888. He was the first of two children born to James and Kate Curtis (nee Foote). James was a journeyman brick and tile maker and the family home was next to a brick kiln.

It was a time of labour on the move and the family left Marnhull in the 1890s and went to Font hill Bishop, in Wiltshire, where James worked as a groom at one of the large houses in or near the village. Sadly, he died of pneumonia when Arthur was just 10 years old and Kate was forced to take in laundry to make ends meet. She moved back to Marnhull and, in 1902, remarried to a recently-bereaved widower, Mark Kendall, a dealer and hawker, who also had children of his own. They went on to have three children together.

Arthur, 26 years old, volunteered to serve in the Army for the duration of the war and he attested at Kingston on 11th Jan 1915. Like many Banstead men, he chose to join the Royal Fusiliers (City of London Regiment).

After completing his basic training, Arthur went to France with the 3rd Battalion on 1st June 1915. They held trenches in the Ypres Salient before heading south in the autumn to fight on the Hohenzollern Redoubt during the Battle of Loos. They arrived in Egypt at the end of the month and arrived at the port city of Salonika (Thessaloniki), in northern Greece, in December. They spent their first few weeks digging rather than fighting and Arthur seems to injured himself or become sick (disease was an occupational risk on the Salonika Front) and left his battalion at the end of the year.

When he returned to duty, it was to join the 8th Royal Fusiliers in northern France. May and June were spent in preparations for the Big Push. The 8th Fusiliers went into action in the Battle of the Somme on 10th July, when they took part in the capture of the fortress-village of Ovillers. When they went over the top, they found that the German machine-guns had not been silenced. The 8th Fusiliers suffered 653 casualties (out of 800 men) that day.

Despite their horrendous losses, they were soon back in the thick of it and fought at Pozieres in early August, taking part in the capture of Ration Trench. Here, Arthur must have been wounded as he left his battalion on 14thAugust. His injuries must have been serious as he spent several months recovering, probably in England, before going back out to France to serve with the 2nd Battalion of the Royal Fusiliers.

At 4pm on 24th April 1917, the Fusiliers took part in an attack on the Blue Line objective in the phase of the Battle of Arras that became known as the Second Battle of the Scarpe. Advancing towards a wood near the village of Monchy, they came under heavy machine-gun fire and took cover in shell holes. One company then charged through the wood whilst two more flanked it and took up positions in pits on the north-east edge of the wood. Here they were sniped at, came under machine-gun fire and heavy shelling. They were not in contact with the battalions either side of them and patrols were sent out to the left and right. The patrol that went right never returned and the one that went left could find no sign of other British troops. With their numbers rapidly dwindling, no support on either flank and the Germans working their way around the edges of the Fusiliers' line, they were ordered to retire back to the British line at 6:50pm.

They suffered 190 casualties that day and Arthur was among the missing. He was later presumed to have been killed in action. He was 28 years old.

Arthur's body was not found or was not identifiable. He is one of eight Banstead men to be commemorated on the Arras Memorial and is also commemorated on the Marnhull War Memorial, the Banstead War Memorial, the Garton Memorial in All Saints, Banstead, churchyard, the memorial panels in the Lady Chapel at All Saints. His war service is recorded in the All Saints' Book of Men Who Served Overseas and a similar book at St Gregory's, Marnhull.

I'm writing to let you know about his commemoration and his story in case of interest but also to appeal for information through this publication. Does Arthur still have family in Marnhull and does anybody have a photograph of him? I can be contacted at banstead 100@btconnect.com.

What does the entry in the war service book at St Gregory's says about him, is there anyone there that would be able to tell me?

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Trading Standards



Alternative Dispute Resolution can help you

If you have a complaint about something you've bought, whether goods or a service, and dealing directly with the trader hasn't worked, you could ask an independent person to look at your consumer problem and try and find a solution. This is known as Alternative Dispute Resolution (ADR). The benefits for consumers are that ADR schemes are usually free or low cost and simple to use.

Ombudsman services are a type of ADR scheme which are impartial and free for consumers to use. They cover:

- financial companies, such as banks, building societies and insurance companies
- retailers, including online retailers
- energy companies
- telephone and internet companies
- furniture removers

There is also a Motor Ombudsman which covers the automotive industry. It can deal with complaints regarding vehicle sales – new and used, service, repair and vehicle warranties, provided the trader is a member. Most main dealers are members. Consumers can also 'rate' garages too.

Many trade associations also offer alternative dispute resolution as part of their services for their members. For instance, The Institute of Professional Willwriters offers a complaints service for complaints against willwriters and ABTA (The Travel Association) covers complaints involving leisure services such as package travel and travel agency services. The Federation of Master Builders covers complaints about the construction of new houses and house maintenance and improvement services, provided the trader is a member.

The Alternative Dispute Resolution Regulations 2015 require almost all businesses which sell directly to consumers to point the consumer to a certified ADR scheme – where they cannot resolve a dispute in-house, and declare whether or not they intend to use that scheme.

So if you have a complaint you can't resolve, always check to see whether your complaint is covered by an ombudsman scheme or other ADR scheme, before considering court action. Indeed, the courts will have expected you to have explored those routes first before bringing the matter to them.

University of the Third Age

The Revd Colin Marsh, who many of you will know, gave us an absorbing account of his cycle ride from Dunkirk to Romania, some 1800 miles. The journey was to help raise funds for Little John's House, a children's home in Cisnadioara, near Sibiu, in the foothills of the Carpathian Mountains in Romania. Colin worked there for a short time in 1996, not long after it was set up to rescue young children from the state-run institutions. The charity now has an opportunity to buy extra land and to extend the facilities to accommodate more children, hence the fund-raising journey.

The trip took 6 weeks to complete, although Colin started from Dunkirk by himself he was joined by his younger brothers later in the journey, at Budapest and they cycled the remaining 400 miles together. The basic itinerary was to follow cycle routs by canals in Belgium and Holland and then rivers all the way to Romania. Colin arranged much of his accommodation on the trip through the Warm Showers Community, which is a free worldwide hospitality exchange for touring cyclists. Much of the route followed the Rhine and Danube but high water levels meant that various detours had to be found around flooded cycle paths which followed the rivers banks. Colin had taken many photographs to illustrate his talk and these showed the beautiful scenery through which he was travelling, the towns and villages encountered and people he had met. His route took him through France, Belgium, Holland, Germany, Austria, Slovakia, Hungary and Romania.

All the Warm Showers hosts made him very welcome, the host in Hoegaarden was a well-known artist who had one of his sculptures fall on him the previous week, but still managed to be the perfect host. Colin's route took in many picturesque places such as Duesburgh, Cologne, Bonn, Koblenz, St. Goar, Rüdesheim, Hockhiem, Frankfurt, Hanau, Aschaffenburg, Wertheim, Würzburg, Happurg, Bamberg, Allersberg, Linz, Dürnstein, (Richard the Lionheart was imprisoned at the castle by the Duke of Austria, until the king's ransom was paid in 1194). The last town visited in Austria was Heinberg, where Colin managed to get his bicycle serviced. Then on in to Slovakia, still following the Danube on European Cycle Way 6. When he reached Esztergorn he managed to look round the basilica and the photographs showed what a magnificent building it is with cupola letting in shafts of sunlight. Then on to Budapest where he met up with his younger brothers. They had break in Márkó for icecream before heading to Romania where they found storks nesting on telegraph poles and chimneys. There first stop in Romania was Oradea and after breakfast they were on their way to Barta where they found that the accommodation was quite palatial. They then set off to Cisnadioara, their final destination. The trip raised over £8000 in sponsorship and will go towards improving the facilities for the children. If you live in or visit Shaftesbury you may be lucky enough see his old butterfly handled bike about town, as his wife has now brought him a new bike, which so far has not been used on such an adventure.


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


